Smelters within the Kingdom of Great Britain, His Hertford, has been prefented to the King by John Majelly (in order to remove all Obfructions upon Trade, fo far as might be confiftent with found Policy) was pleafed, by His Order in Council of Interference of the faid County, and William Baker and George Majelly (in order to remove all Obstructions upon Trade, fo far as might be confistent with found Policy) was pleased, by His Order in Council of the roth of last Month, to permit and allow Cop-per of the Weight and Dimensions described in the taid Order, to be carried Coastwife or exported, under certain Restrictions and Conditions therein forecified : And whereas His Majelly indees it as fpecified : And whereas His Majelly judges it ne-ceffary for the Public Good, at this critical Conjuncture, that the Exportation or Carrying Copper Coaftwife, fhould continue to be prohibited for fome Time longer, excert under the Refrictions and Conditions allowed by the above recited Order of the 10th of May laft. His Majefty is thereupon pleafed, with the Advice of His Privy Council, io order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Prohibition upon the Exportation or Carrying of Copper Coastwife be continued for Six Months, to commence from the 22d Day of this inflant June; but it is His Majefty's Pleature that the fame shall not be taken to extend to any Sort of Copper to be exported or fent Coaffwife by the Committioners of His Majesty's Navy, or their Officers or Agents, for His Majetty's Service; or to the carrying Coaftwife or exporting of Copper in Sheets, weighing lefs than Twelve and more than Forty Ounces to the Foot fuperficial, to any Parts berond the Sea, to which the fame may be lawfolly exported, upon Con-dition, that all fuch Copper be infpected and examined by an Agent or Agents appointed or to be appointed by the Commissioners of His Majefty's Navy; and that a Certificate, under the Hand and Seal of the faid Agent or Agents shall be first had and obtained, fetting forth, that no Part of fuch Copper confilts of Sheets weighing more than Twelve Ounces and lefs than Forty Ounces inclusive to the Foot superficial; which Certificate from the faid Agent shall be delivered to the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port in which the faid Copper is intended to be fhipped, and fhall be their Authority for allowing the Quantity of Copper fpecified in the faid Certificate to be put on Board, in order to be carried Coaftwife or exported : And His Majetty is hereby further pleafed to permit and allow the Exportation of Copper in Sheets weighing more than Twelve Ounces and lefs than Forty Ounces inclusive to the Foot fuperficial, provided that the fame shall confist of Pieces not exceeding Four Pounds Weight in any One Piece; and that a Certificate thereof be obtained in Manner above directed, before fuch Copper be laden or pur on Board ; and also to permit the carrying Coasswife of Copper in Sheets weighing more than Twelve Ounces and lefs than Forty Ounces inclusive to the Foot fuperficial, upon Condition that no more than Five Hundred Weight of fuch Copper shall be shipt by any one Person or Partnership, and that the Quantity put on Board any one Ship or Veffel shall not exceed Ten Hun. dred Weight in the Whole, unless Security by Bond hath first been given to the proper Officers of His Majelty's Customs, in Treble the Value of such Copper, to carry the fame to the Places propoled, and none other; and to produce and deliver a Certificate or Certificates, within Two Months from the Date of the Bond, from the proper Officers of the Cultoms at the Ports for which any fuch Copper shall be entered and cleared out, of the same having been all duly landed at such Ports; which Certificate or Certificates such Officer is hereby required to give ; and the fame Certificate or Certifi-cates the Commiffioners of the Cuftoms are hereby quired to transmit to the Lords Commissioners of His Majefty's Treasury, in order to be laid before this Board. And the Lords Commissioners of His Majefty's Treasfury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.
