Custom-House, London, August 29, 1782.

Whereas the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs have received Information, that great Quantities of Foreign Tobacco, and Tobacco Stalks, and Snuff, are frequently brought to London in Stage Coaches, Waggon, and other Carriages, having been first clandestinely imported and run on different Parts of the Coasts of this Kingdom. And whereas by an Act passed in the Fifth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, and several other Acts of Parliament now in Force, it is enacted, that the Persons employed in the Running, Removing, Carriage, or Conveyance of such Goods, shall forfeit Treble the Value thereof, and the Vessels, Horses, Cattle, Carts, and other Carriages made Use of in Landing, Loading, Carrying, or Removing such Goods, shall also be forfeited and lost; and if any Tobacco or Tobacco Stalks, exceeding in Quantity Twenty-four Pounds Weight, or any Snuff, exceeding Ten Pounds Weight, is found removing without a Certificate from the Collector and Comptroller of the Customs, that the Duties have been paid for the same, in the Manner directed by an Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, besides the Loss of such Tobacco, Tobacco Stalks, and Snuff, together with the Cattle and Carriages used in Removing such Goods, the Carrier or Person employed or entrusted in Removing, Carrying, or conveying the same, shall be committed to the County Jail, for One Month, by any Justice of the Peace for the County wherein the Offence is committed, or the Offender shall be found:— In order therefore to put a Stop to a Practice so very prejudicial to the Public Revenue, and injurious to the fair Trader, the Commissioners of the Customs have directed this Public Notice to be given, that the Owners and Drivers of Stage Coaches, Waggon, and other Carriages, as well as other Persons concerned in this illicit Trade, may be fully apprized of the Penalties and Forfeitures inflicted by Law, and for which they are liable to be prosecuted.
