

assembled for the first time, his Highness the Prince of Orange came not from *Soestdyke* as was expected; the Raed Pentonary having acquainted them, in his Highness's Name, with such matters he desired they should have communication of, and among others, it's said, his Highness intended Voyage for England was one. Several Men of War and Yachts are in a day or two expected from England, being sent by His Majesty to transport his Highness; in them will come, as our Letters from England inform us, Sir *Gabriel Silvius*, to receive and Compliment his Highness on the part of His Majesty. From *Emden* we have an account, That several Hostilities had passed between those of that City, and the Troops of the Bishop of *Munster*, whom that Bishop had put into several places, to favour the Pretensions of the Princess's Regent against the States. We have Letters from the Camp before *Stetin* of the 27th past, which tell us, That the Besiegers had discovered two Mines of the Besieged, and that they had sprung several others on their side, by means whereof they had lodged themselves in three several places on the Counterscarp; and that the *Lunenburgh* Troops had on their side possessed themselves of a certain Outwork, and that they hoped now very suddenly to be Masters of the place, though hitherto the Inhabitants seem not to abate any thing of their first courage and resolution.

Brussels, *Octob. 8.* Our Armies continue encamped near *Enghein*, which they are demolishing, as they will likewise do *Nivelle*; which done, it's believe they will separate, and go into Winter quarters; 12 Battalions of Dutch Infantry are to winter at *Mus*, under the command of Monsieur *Cassopin*; 4 will be here, as many at *Gharent* 2 at *Malines*, where Count *Waldeck* will reside this Winter and the rest will be distributed into other places in these Provinces; so that in case there be any occasion, they may be drawn together again in twice 48 hours. The *Marschal Humieres* is returned to *Nemele*, with the Forces under his command, and hath joined with those Troops which Monsieur *de la Cardonniere* commanded. But the Duke of *Luxemburg* remains at *Gare* with the rest of the French Troops. Our Letters from *Alsace* of the 27th past, and of the first instant, inform us, that the Duke of *Lorraine* was encamped with the Imperial Cavalry near *Bischofsheim*, not far from *Strasbourg* on the other side of the *Rhine*; that the Troops of the Duke of *Saxe-Eysenach* had joined him; that the next day, being the 2d, he expected the coming up of his Infantry, and in the mean time had given Orders for the laying a Bridge over the *Rhine*, which his Troops should pass, while his Baggage and Artillery passed the Bridge of *Strasbourg*.

Paris, *Octob. 9.* Yesterday the Count *Ferrero*, Ambassador from the Dutchess Regent of *Savoy*, was with the usual Ceremonies introduced to his Audience of Leave of his Majesty, being on his return home. A Courier arrived yesterday from *Rome*, brings an account of the death of Cardinal *Massini*, so that there are now nine places vacant in the College of Cardinals. From *Alsace* we have Letters of the 3d instant, which say, that the Duke of *Saxe-Eysenach* had with the Troops under his command joined the Imperial Army, which was advanced as far as *Bischofsheim*, the said Duke having refused to make use of the Passport obtained for his Troops by the Magistrates of *Strasbourg*; That the *Marschal de Crequi*, to deprive the Enemy of all subsistence, had sent to the said Magistrates, to require them to burn all the Forage, and all the Mills in their Neighborhood, within two dayes, which otherwise he would find means to do himself. That on the first and second instant, the *Marschal de Crequi* repassed the *Rhine* at *Rheinow*, and encamped at *Mertzenheim* between *Brussels* and *Strasbourg*; of which the Duke of *Lorraine* having notice he immediately decamped, and the 4d instant at night passed the *Rhine* over the Bridge of *Strasbourg*; so that the Armies are now again in *Alsace*. The Letters we receive this week from *Germany*, tell us that *Catana* was not besieged as had been reported, but that our Troops had taken a certain Fort near it, which did very much incommode it, and that the Duke *de Vivonne* was in the Field with 13000 Foot, and 1500 Horse. We have nothing new from *Flanders*, save that our Troops have made a great destruction in *Flanders*, to hinder the Enemy from taking Winter-quarters there. The Count *de Neuss*, and his Lady, Sister to the Count *de Lauzun*, who has been long a Prisoner at *Signe-*

rol, have liberty to go and see him. We have advice from *Brest*, that Viceadmiral *d'Estree* was sailed from thence with the Ships under his command, as was believed, for the *West-Indies*.

Perismouth, *Sept. 30.* This morning arrived at *Spithead* the Charity of *Tarmouth*, *George Penny* Master, from *O Porto*, who in his Voyage spoke with a Ketch coming from the *Streights*, the Master whereof had been on Board Sir *John Narborough* Admiral of His Majesty's Fleet in the *Mediterran sea*, and informed the said Mr *Penny*, that Sir *John* had taken two *Algierine* Men of War, in order to the procuring satisfaction for the damages done by those Corsairs to His Majesty's Subjects.

Lyme, *Octob. 1.* The 29th past arrived here the *Adventure*, *William Lucas* Master, in five dayes from *Croscique* in *France*; the Master tells us, that on the 14th past, being in company with three other Merchantmen outward bound, they met with a Spanish Man of War of *Biscay* within 4 Leagues of *Croscique*, who commanded the Masters on board, very evilly intreated them, and very sorely wounded one of them to make him confess what money he had, which they took from him, being about 90 l. The other Masters were also plundered to a very considerable value, notwithstanding they had all Passes very authentick and good. The said Privateer had four Guns and 45 men, and was some dayes after taken by the *French*.

Dover, *Octob. 2.* Last Night arrived here the Mail from *Newport*, from whence we have advice, that the French Army is still near *Ghent*, but would march in few dayes towards *Ipres*. The last Pacquet-Boat that went from hence to *Newport*, carried over six Passengers all Englishmen, who at their arrival there were carried before the Governor by a Guard and by his command immediately conveyed out of the Gates, not being suffered to stay in the Town to take the least refreshment.
