**I**MPRESSED with Sentiments of Veneration and Respect for the Honor of your Majesty's Crown, the Happiness of your illustrious Family, and the Prosperity of your Dominions, we receive with Satisfaction, and contemplate with Pleasure, your Majesty's gracious and benign Condescension to the earnest Wishes and Prayers of your People to conclude an expensive and desolating War. We rejoice in the Prospect of the Blessings attendant on Peace: Blessings, the Effects of which, we hope, will in Time produce universal Joy, and ultimately terminate in the general Good.

Attached by Principles of Affection and Loyalty to your Majesty's Person and Government, we sincerely wish the entire Restoration of Public Tranquillity, the most perfect Unanimity and Concord in every Part of the State; and that your Majesty may long reign the revered Sovereign of a happy and free People.

**W**E, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, desire your Majesty's Royal Permission to express our warmest Sentiments of Duty and Gratitude to your Majesty for your tender Regard to the true Happiness and Welfare of your People, in relieving them from the increasing Burthens of a long and expensive War, and procuring them the inestimable Blessings of Peace.

We beg Leave thus publicly to declare our entire Approbation of the Treaty of Peace, which we trust is concluded on such Terms of Moderation and Equity as afford us the fairest Prospect of its Continuance; and this we think it our Duty to do at this Time, being apprehensive our Silence might be interpreted as an Encouragement of those factious Measures that have lately caused such Confusion in your Majesty's Councils, and which our Regard for the Interest and Welfare of the Nation, leads us to detest and abhor.

We assure your Majesty that nothing in our Power shall be wanting that may in any Degree con-

tribute to render your Majesty's Reign easy and happy, over a loyal and grateful People.
