

My present weak State will not allow of my entering into a particular Detail of the late March of the Army towards Cuddalore, and its Return, together with the other Occurrences which have since happened.

Major General Sir Hector Munro has resigned the Service, and returns to Europe in the Myrtle Transport, which fails in a few Days. Major General Stuart, who has been constantly in the Field during the whole of this Year's Campaign, will in Consequence succeed to the Chief Command of the Company's Troops on this Establishment. He has been in Command of the Army ever since my Illness, in the Conduct of which he has shewn the most indefatigable Activity, in a Manner highly to his own Honour, and much to my Satisfaction.
