YESTERDAY Evening David Hartley, Esq; arrived with the Definitive Treaty between His Majesty and the United States of America, which was signed at Paris the 3d Instant by him, as His Majesty's Plenipotentiary, and by the Plenipotentiaries of the United States.

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons, of the City of London, in Common Council assembled, humbly beg Leave to approach your Majesty with the sincerest Congratulations on the Birth of another Princess, and the happy Recovery of your Illustrious Consort.

We would express with more than ordinary Effusions of Joy our Feelings upon this Occasion, that Providence has been pleased to answer the Prayers and Wishes of every Order of your Majesty's loyal Subjects, in preserving the invaluable Life of our gracious Queen; a Life so eminently useful, and so conspicuously exemplary.

IT is this Day ordered by His Majesty in Council, That the Embargo at present subsisting

upon Ships and Vessels laden or to be laden in the Ports of Great Britain and Ireland with Provisions, be taken off; and that the several Regulations contained in His Majesty's Order of the 18th of August, 1780, shall cease and determine: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Lieutenant of His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, are to give such Directions for taking off the said Embargo, as to them may respectively appertain.

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for preventing certain Instruments from being required from Ships belonging to the United States of America, and to give to His Majesty, for a limited Time, certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the said United States," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That in any Case, where a Certificate is required to discharge any Bond entered into for the detaining Goods within the said United States, such Bond shall and may be discharged upon a Certificate under the Hands and Seals of any Officers who are or may be appointed by the said United States, or any of them, for that Purpose; and if it shall happen that there shall not be any Officer so appointed, then, and in such Case, such Bond shall and may be discharged upon a Certificate, under the Hand and Seal of any Magistrate of the said United States, or any of them, certifying that there is no such Officer at such Port or Place, and that Oath hath been made before such Magistrate, by the Master or other Person having the Charge of such Ship, that the Goods, for which such Certificate is required, were duly landed by him within the said United States. And by the said Act it is also further enacted, That, during the Continuance of the said Act, it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to give such Directions and to make such Regulations with respect to Duties, Drawbacks or otherwise, for carrying on the Trade and Commerce between the People and Territories belonging to the Crown of Great Britain, and the People and Territories of the said United States, as to His Majesty in Council shall appear most expedient and salutary, any Law, Usage or Custom to the contrary notwithstanding. And whereas by an Act passed in the Twelfth Year of King Charles the Second, commonly called the Act of Navigation, and several other Acts made in this Kingdom, certain Enumerated Articles are not to be carried from any British Colony or Plantation in America, unless to some other British Colony or Plantation, or to this Kingdom, and upon the sailing of every Ship from this Kingdom, or from any such British Colony or Plantation, Bond and Security is required to be taken for the carrying such Enumerated Goods, according to the Directions of the said Acts. And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the 2d of July last, it was judged expedient to permit that Rum, Sugar, Melasses, Coffee, Cocoa Nut, Ginger, and Pimento,

mento, should, until further Order, be exported by British Subjects, in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any of His Majesty's West India Islands, to any Port or Place within the United States of America, upon the Payment of the same Duties on Exportation, and subject to the like Rules, Regulations, Securities and Restrictions, as the same Articles by Law are or may be subject or liable to, if exported to any British Colony or Plantation in America: His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby further direct, That for Ships clearing out from any of the Ports of this Kingdom to any of His Majesty's West India Islands, or from any of His Majesty's said West India Islands, which shall take on Board there any of the Articles permitted by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 2d of July last, to be carried from thence to any Port or Place within the United States of America, the Bonds and Securities, heretofore required to be taken for such Ships, shall and may be cancelled and discharged, upon the like Certificates as are required by the above recited Act to discharge any Bonds given in Great Britain for the due landing any other Goods in the said United States of America: And His Majesty is further pleased to order and direct, that all Bonds and Securities which shall have been taken since the said 2d of July last, for any Ship clearing out to or from any of His Majesty's West India Islands, shall in like Manner be cancelled and discharged upon the like Certificates as are herein before directed: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Constantinople, August 8. The unseasonable Weather still continues here with little Variation, but the Mortality occasioned by the Contagion seems to increase, more People having been carried off, during the last three Days, than in so short an Interval at the Time of the memorable Plague in 1778.

Petersburgh, August 12. On Saturday last, at Nine o'Clock in the Evening, Her Imperial Highness the Great Duchess was safely delivered of a Princess at

Czarko-Zelo. This joyful Event was immediately announced to the Public by a Discharge of Two Hundred and One Pieces of Cannon. The newborn Princess is named Alexandrina Pawleona.

Vienna, August 27. The Military Manœuvres at the Camp of Minckendorff took Place the 23d Instant, in Presence of the Emperor, who returned to this Capital the same Day about Noon; and on Monday Morning last His Imperial Majesty set out for the Camp near Brunn in Moravia.

Whitehall, August 30, 1783.

WHEREAS, by an Inquisition taken the 20th Day of this Instant August, before Cuthbert Smith, Esq; Mayor and Coroner of the ancient Town of Rye, — Ketchly, otherwise called Laughing Dick, late of Horn-street, in the Parish of Orlesone, in the County of Kent, Mariner. Thomas Moore, late of Rye, in the County of Sussex. Mariner, and Edward Kyte, late of Dover, in the said County of Kent, Mariner, (together with divers others of the Crew of a Lug-sail or Smuggling Vessel, whose Names are at present unknown) stand charged with the wilful Murder of Henry Haddock, late Master or Commander of a Vessel called the Scourge; in the Service of His Majesty's Customs, the said Henry Haddock being, on the 19th Day of the said Month, on Board the said Vessel off Dungeness Point, in the said County of Kent, in order to intercept and make Seizure of any Goods that might be attempted to be run or put on Shore on that Part of the Coast; and in the Execution of such his Duty, certain Carriage and other Guns or Musquets were fired by the said — Ketchly, Thomas Moore, and Edward Kyte, and the Rest of the Crew belonging to the said Smuggling Vessel, upon the said Vessel in the Service of His said Majesty's Customs, by one of which the said Henry Haddock was mortally wounded, and instantly died:

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Murder, is hereby pleased to promise His Most Gracious Pardon to any one of the said Offenders, who shall discover his Accomplices (except the said — Ketchly, Thomas Moore, and Edward Kyte) so that Two or more of them may be apprehended and convicted of the said Offence.

And, as a further Encouragement, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs do hereby promise a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person or Persons who shall apprehend and take, or cause to be apprehended and taken, the said — Ketchly, Thomas Moore, and Edward Kyte, or either of them, to be paid by the Receiver-General of His Majesty's Customs upon Conviction; and if in Consequence of such Discovery and Apprehending any One or more of the said Offenders shall be taken, tried and convicted of the said Offence, the Person making such Discovery shall be entitled to the like Reward.

WHEREAS the Dover Waggon was, on its Passage from Canterbury to London, on Wednesday the 20th Day of August last, about the Hour of Twelve at Noon, stopped near the Six Mile Stone on Blackbeath, and the Waggoner, and one James Dray, Servant to Mr. Tankard, one of the Officers of the Customs, who accompanied him on Horseback, and having with him a led Horse, which he permitted the Waggoner to ride, were surrounded by divers Persons armed with Pistols, Clubs, and other offensive Weapons, to the Number of Ten, or thereabouts, who, by Force and Violence, took Possession of the Waggon, and compelled the Waggoner

to drive the same out of the Publick Road, up a Private Lane near the Park Pales, and then and there feloniously took out of the said Waggon Two Wood-n Cases, containing Twenty-one Bags of Tea, weighing upwards of Four Hundred and Eighty Pounds, Part of a much larger Quantity, which they put into a Cart brought with them for that Purpose, and which they feloniously carried away: And also feloniously took from the Person of the said James Dray his Pistol, and two other Pistols wrapt up in a Parcel, knocked him off his Horse, and trampled upon him with their Horses, so that his Life was in the most imminent Danger: They also feloniously stole and carried away both the Horses with which the said James Dray was coming to Town, which have since been recovered: But an Alarm being given, that some Persons were in Pursuit of these Horses which had been so stolen, they were disturbed in the further Robbery of the Waggon, and made their Retreat.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in this most daring Highway Robbery, is hereby pleased to promise His most Gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover Two or more of his Accomplices therein, so that they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
