upon Ships and Veffels laden or to be laden in the Ports of Great Britain and Ireland with Providents, be taken off; and that the feveral Regulations contained in His Majefty's Order of the 1850 of August, 1780, shall cease and determine: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majefty's Freasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Lieutenant of His Majefty's Kingdom of Ireland, are to give fuch Directions for taking off the faid Embargo, as to them may respectively appertain.

ESENT,

The KING's Moil Excellent Majefty in Council. HEREAS by an Act of Parliament paffed in the last Semon of Parliament, intituled, An Act for preventing certain Inforuments from "being required from Ships belonging to the "United States of America, and to give to His "Majefty, for a limited Time, certain Powers" " for the better carrying on Frade are Com-" merce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Lo-" minions and the Inhabitarts of the taid United " States," it s, amo gft other Things, chaded, That in any Cafe, where a Certificate is required to difcharge any bond entered into for the ductanding Gouas within the faid United States, fuch bond fhall and may be discharged upon a Certificate under the friands and Seals of any Officers who are or may be appointed by the faid United States, or any of them, for that Purpole; and if it fail happen that there shall not be any Officer to appointed, then, and in fuch Cafe, fuch Bond shall and may be difcharged upon a Certificate, under the Hand and Seal of any Magistrate of the faid United States, or vay of them, certifying that there is no fuch Officer at fuch Port or Place, and that Oath hath been made before fuch Magistate, by the Master or other Person Laving the Charge of fuch Ship, that the Goods, for which fuch Certificate is required, were duly landed by him within the faid United States. And by the faid Act it is also further enacted, That, during the Continuance of the faid Act, it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to give fuch Directions and to make fuch Regulations with respect to Duties, Drawbacks or otherwife, for carrying on the Trade and Com-merce between the People and Territories belonging to the Crown of Great Britain, and the People and Territories of the faid United States, as to His Majefty in Council shall appear most expedient and falutary, any Law, Ufage or Cuñom to the contrary notwithfianding. And a hereas by an Act paffed in the Twelfth Year of King Charles the Second, commonly called the Act of Navigation, and feveral other Acts made in this Kingdom, certain Enumerated Articles are not to be carried from any Britiln Colony or Plantation in America, unlefs to form other British Colony or Plantation, or to this Kingdom, and upon the failing of every Ship from this Kingdom, or from any fuch British Colony or Plantation, Bond and Security is required to be taken for the carrying fuch Enumerated Goods, according to the Directions of the faid Acts. And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the zd of July lait, it was judged expedient to permit that Rum, Sugar, Melattes, Coffer, Cocoa Nuts, Giager, and Pimenio.
