HEREAS His Majesty hath been pleased to issue His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date at His Majesty's Court at St. James's, the 26th Day of September last, in the Words following, viz.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS a Definitive Treaty of Peace and Friendship between Us, the Most Christian King, and the King of Spain, hath been concluded at Ver-failles on the Third Day of this Instant September, and the Ratifications thereof have been exchanged upon the Nineteenth Instant: In Conformity thereunto, We have thought fit to command, That the same be published throughout all Our Dominions. And We do declare to all Our loving Subjects, Our Will and Pleasure, That the said Treaty of Peace and Friendship be observed inviolably, as well by Sea as Land, and in all Places whatfoever; frietly charging and commanding all Our loving Subjects to take Notice hereof, and to conform themselves thereunto accordingly.

And whereas ris Majesty hath signified His Royal Pleasure, that the said Proclamation be forthwith published in this Kingdom; We the Lord Lieutenant, in Opediance to His Majesty's faid Command. do hereby public His Majesty's faid Royal Pro-clamation accordingly, strictly charging and commanding all His Majesty's loving Subjects to take Notice thereof, and to comform themselves according to the Tenor of the faid Proclamation.

Definitive Treaty of Peace and Friendship having been concluded at Versailles on the 3d Day of September last, between His Majesty, the Most Christian King, and the King of Spain; and the Ratifications thereof having been ex-changed on the 19th of said Month, we do hereby authorize and require you, in Company of the Serjeant at Arms, Pursuivants, and other Offices belonging to the State, to publish the said Peace at the usual Places, and in the accustomed Manner, within the City of Dublin, according to the Tenor of the Proclamation herewith fent you; which is to be done on Monday next the 13th In-stant, between the Hours of Eleven and Twelve o'Clock in the Forencon, when the Lord Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and the Sheriffs of Dublin are to be prefent, as in like Cases has been accultomed.
