Proof Relations of Mr. Israel Wornall, deceased.

MR. He likewise left a Sister in Law surviving him, who was Elizabeth, once Wife of his then deceased elder Brother, Mr. Isaac Wornall, of London, Packer; and who, after the same Isaac's Death, married one Mr. Samuel Torin, and died his Widow in 1775. The said Testator had served his Apprenticeship with one Mr. Aurelius Hudson, a Dyer, who is supposed to have survived him. And it is now at present apprehended that the said Testator's Father, Grandfather, and Great Grandfather were as follow: The Father, Israel, born at Almondbury aforesaid; the Grandfather, Isaac, and the Great Grandfather, Isaac, both of them buried there, and who had resided (more or less) at that Place; and that the said Testator's Father had several Sisters, of whom one married a Mr. Foxcroft, another married a Mr. Swain, and another married a Michael Middlebrook.
