## St. James's, July 10.

AS several Artificers and Manufadurers, Subjects Great Britain, have from Time to Time gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms; The following Abstrates of Two Ass of Parliament of George the First and George the Second, to prevent such Practices, are published for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them.—And it will be observed, that they extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, and in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries, out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof upon Indictment or Information, in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Affizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS or the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Perfon having been once convict, shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majetty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's

Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where fuch Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from thenceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Personshall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, and of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise or Purchase; and shall forseit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made upon Oath before any Justice of Peace that any Person is endeavour-ing to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted, or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes afore-said; such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Seffions: And if such Person shall resuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall! be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artisicer shall be convicted upon Indictment of any fuch Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas for the Purpole aforefaid, he shall give such Security to the King, not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned sill Security

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary, or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country, not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted upon In-dictment or Information in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Impriforment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Foreiture be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forseit, for every Person contracted with or seduced; ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such

Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat not bound directly to fime Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Bri. tain, any fuch Tools or Utenfils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufacturers or any Part of fuch Tools, he shall for every Of-fence forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts, in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utenfils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on goard any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publickly fold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize

and fecure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall for every such Offence forseit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUN DRED POUNDS, but thall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment

under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly fuffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or fign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the faid Tools, or knowingly fuffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforefaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office

under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

WHEREAS it bas been humbly represented to the King. That on Thursday the 15th Instant, a most considerable Quantity of Tea and Foreign Spirits was run on Shore near Christ Church, within the Limits of the Port of Southampton, from Two large Lug sail Vesses, by a numerous Gang of Smuglers, in Defiance of the Laws of the Revenue, and in Opposition to the Officers of His Mitjesty's Customs employed in the Execution thereof, who, notwithstanding their utmost Endeavours, were unable to resist so large a Body of desperate and armed Men:

That upon Information being received that the faid Two Smugling Veffels had taken Shelter in Christ Church Harbour, an Attempt was made, on the Even-ing of the faid 15th Instant, by the Officers and Crew of His Majesty's Sloop of War the Orestes, in Conjunction with the Officers of the Savan Cutter, in the Service of the Customs, and of a Cutter in the Service of the Excise, in their respective Boats, manned and armed, to seize and take Possession of the said Smugling Veffels :

That in the Execution of this Service they were most wislenely and forcibly resisted by a large Body of Smuglers, armed with Fire Arms and other offensive Weapons, who were affembled on board the faid Vefsils, and on Shore, for that Purpose, and who fired upon the Officers, and killed Mr. William Allen, the Master of the Said Sloop of War the Orestes, (who, by wirtue of a Commission from the Board of Customs, was likewife an Officer of that Revenue) and also dangerously wounded one of the Bout's Crew:

That the Officers however resolutely persevered in

the Execution of their Duty, boarded and Jeized both the said Smugling Vessels, and, after having taken Possession thereof, carried them into the Port of Cowes; but that the Persons concerned in this atrocious Out-

rage and Murder made their Elcape.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing Justice the Persons concerned therein, is bereby pleased to promise His most gracious Purdon to any one of the said Offenders (except the Person who actually fixed and killed the said Mr. Allen) who shall discover his Accomplices, so that Two or more of them may be apprehended and convicted of the said Offence.

And, as a farther Encouragement, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Custems do hereby offer a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person or Persons who shall discover and apprehend; or cause to be discovered and apprehended, any Two or more of the Said Offenders, to be paid by the Receiver-General

of His Majesty's Customs upon Conviction.

And if any one of the faid Offenders shall, within Three Months from the Date bereof, discover his Accomplices, so that two of them at least be appr. hended and convicted of the faid Offence, the Offender making such Discovery shall be entitled to the like Reward.

"Adair, the Recorder's Wise," in the same Street, containing the mast horrid Impresenting and the most specifing taining the most borrid Imprecations, and the most specking and indecent Expressions, and threatening to murder the faid James Adair, Esq; and his Wife, and to burn his House, were delivered by the Penny-Post Letter-Carrier at the House of the said James Adair, Esq; abovementioned, on the 20th Duy of this Instant July, and appear to be written with a View to obstruct the Course of Justice, by preventing the Execution of William. Thompson, who is now under Sentence of Death in Neavgate for Forgery :

- His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in writing and sending the Incendiar, Letters abovementioned, doth hereby promise His most Gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letters) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further Encouragement, His Majesty and hereby offer a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person making such Discovery qi, aforesaid, (except as is before excepted) to be paid by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders.

BY, an All of the lost, and also one of the present Seffion of Parliament, for establishing certain Regulations concerning the Portage and Conveyance of Letters and Packets by the Post between Great Britain and Ireland, to take Place on the 1st of August next, all Letters and Packets are to be charged and paid for ac-Britain, and the Rates established by the Ast of Parliament in Ireland, except to and from certain Persons who, by Virtue of the respective Offices in Great Britain and Ireland, now send and receive Letters and Parlia to the form the During Rates and the form the f Packets free from the Duty of Postage, provided that all such Letters and Packets for fent shall relate to the Business of their respective Offices, and that there shall be certified on the Outside of such Letters and Packets, under the Hand Writing of such Officers respectively to be On His Majesty's Service, and that such Letters and Packets shall be sealed with the Seal of the Office, or an Officer sense such of the Office, or or Officer Sending the Same. And in Case any Juch Offisers shall receive under Cover to them any Letters or Packets intended for or directed to other Persons, all fuch Officers are required to fend the same to the General Post Office in London, or Dublin, in order that such Letters and Packets may be charged with the Duty of Postage; it being the true Intent and Meaning of this At, that the Privilege of sending and receiving Letters and Packets by such Officers, shall extend to such Letters and Packets only, as relate to the Business of their respective Offices.

It is also enacted, That all Persons may fend printed Votes, Proceedings in Parliament, and printed News Papers to and from Great Britain and Ireland, at the Rate of One Penny only for each printed Vote, Proceeding in Parliament, and each printed News Paper, in Covers open at Both Ends, to be paid when they are put into any Post-Office in Great Britain; but the Penny need not be paid before band upon Pupers from Ireland, as it can be received on their Delivery in Great

Britain.

It is likewife enacted; That His Majesty's Postmaster-General may authorize certain Persons to send and re-ceive printed Votes, Proceedings in Parliament, and printed News Papers by the Post to and from Great Britain and Ireland, at the Rate of One Penny only for each printed Vote, and Proceeding in Parliament, and each printed News Paper, over and above the printed Price thereon.

All Persons therefore who wish to be supplied with News Papers for Ineland, or from Ireland for Great Britain, may have them regularly fent, by applying by Letter, or otherwise, to the Clerk of the Chesker Road, at the General Post-Office in London, or to the Postmaster of any Town in Great Britain, where a News Paper is printed; or to the Secretary of the General Post-

Office in Dublin.

each, with 1d. for the Postage, will be 3l. 4s. per
Annum; an Evening Paper three Times a Week, 2l. 12s. per Annum, and so in Proportion for the London Gazettes, other Papers, &c. And by an Ast possed in the last Session of the Parliament of Ireland, each British News Paper, &c. will in all Parts of Ireland
