**T**HIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, the Lord President of the Council, and several other Lords therein mentioned, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

*An Act for laying additional Duties upon Papers, Pasteboards, Millboards, and Scaleboards; and for explaining certain Doubts respecting the Duties imposed by an Act made in the Twenty-first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for repealing the present Duties upon Paper, Pasteboards, Millboards, and Scaleboards, made in Great Britain, and for granting other Duties in Lieu thereof.*

*An Act to revive and continue an Act, made in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for encouraging the Manufacture of Leather, by lowering the Duty payable upon the Importation of Oak Bark, when the Price of such Bark shall exceed a certain Rate, for a limited Time; and for extending several Acts of Parliament relative to the Manufacture of Leather to that Part of Great Britain called Scotland.*

*An Act for further continuing, for a limited Time, an Act made in the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for preventing certain Instruments from being required from Ships belonging to the United States of America; and to give to His Majesty, for a limited Time, certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the said United States.*

*An Act for the Preservation and Encouragement of the Hat Manufactory within this Realm, by preventing the Exportation of British Hare Skins, British Hare Wool and British Coney Wool, and all undressed or untarred British Coney Skins, and for preventing any of the said Skins from being stained or dyed, and for the Importation of Goats Hair into this Kingdom, Duty free.*

*An Act to discontinue the Petty Custom on Aliens Goods imported into Great Britain, and the Duty of One per Centum on Goods exported to, or imported from, the Mediterranean Seas, in unqualified Ships; and for repealing so much of an Act, passed in the Fourth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, as*

*enacts, that no Part of the Old Subsidy shall be drawn back upon Goods exported to the British Colonies or Plantations in America.*

*An Act for enabling Sir Ashton Lever to dispose of his Museum, as now exhibited at Leicester-House, by Way of Chance.*

*An Act for amending and rendering more effectual an Act of the Twenty-eighth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty, intituled, An Act for the better Relief and Employment of the Poor of the Borough of Dunbeved, otherwise Launceston, and Parish of Saint Mary Magdalen, in the County of Cornwall, and for vesting the Aftermowth of certain Common Lands within the Borough in Trustees, for the Purposes therein mentioned.*

*An Act for repealing an Act, made in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of King George the Second, for repairing and widening certain Roads leading to and from the Towns of Salford, Warrington, Bolton, and Wigan, and to certain Places called The Broad Oak, in Worsley, and Duxbury Stocks, in the County Palatine of Lancaster; for making more effectual Provision for repairing and widening the said Roads; and also for making, altering and widening the Road from a Place called South Sea, in Pendlebury, to Agecroft Bridge, and from thence, through Hilton Lane, to Dawson Lane End; and also from Agecroft Bridge, over Kersal Moor, to Singleton Brook, in the said County.*

*An Act for altering and amending an Act of the Thirteenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for appointing Wardens and Assay-Masters for assaying Wrought Plate in the Towns of Sheffield and Birmingham, so far as relates to the said Town of Sheffield.*

**W**HEREAS by virtue of an Act passed in the Twenty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for preventing certain Instruments from being required from Ships belonging to the United States of America, and to give to His Majesty, for a limited Time, certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the said United States," which said Act was continued, by an Act passed this present Session of Parliament, until the 1st Day of August, 1784, His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 16th of April last, to make divers Regulations for carrying on the Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions, and the Inhabitants of the United States of America. And whereas by another

another Act also passed in this present Session of Parliament, the Powers granted to His Majesty, by the said first recited Act, are further continued until the 5th Day of April, 1785; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, that any unmanufactured Goods or Merchandizes, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law, (except Oil) and any Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Indico, Masts, Yards and Bowsprits, being the Growth or Production of any of the United States of America, may (until further Order) be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, either in British or American Ships, by British Subjects, or by any of the People inhabiting in, and belonging to, the said United States, or any of them, and may be entered and landed in any Port in this Kingdom, upon Payment of the same Duties as the like Sort of Goods or Merchandize are or may be subject and liable to, if imported by British Subjects, in British Ships, from any British Island or Plantation in America, and no other; notwithstanding such Goods or Merchandize, or the Ships in which the same may be brought, may not be accompanied with the Certificates or other Documents heretofore required by Law:—

And it is hereby further ordered, that there shall be the same Drawbacks, Exemptions and Bounties on Merchandizes and Goods exported from Great Britain, into the Territories of the said United States of America, or any of them, as are or may be allowed by Law, upon the Exportation of the like Goods or Merchandize to any of the Islands, Plantations, or Colonies, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in America.

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that any Tobacco, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the said United States of America, may (until further Order) be imported directly from thence, in Manner abovementioned, and may be landed in this Kingdom; and, upon the Importer paying down, in ready Money, the Duty commonly called the Old Subsidy (except as hereinafter excepted) such Tobacco may be warehoused under His Majesty's Locks, upon the Importer's own Bond for Payment of all the farther Duties due for such Tobacco, within the Time limited by Law, according to the net Weight and Quantity of such Tobacco, at the Time it shall be so landed, with the same Allowances for the Payment of such farther Duties, and under the like Restrictions and Regulations in all other Respects, not altered by this Order, as such Tobacco is and may be warehoused by virtue of any Act or Acts of Parliament in Force; but it is His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheless, that upon the Importation of any such Tobacco into the Ports of London, Bristol, Portsmouth, Cowes, Liverpool, Falmouth, Whitehaven, Hull, Greenock, and Port Glasgow, or either of them, in the Manner herein before expressed, the Importer shall be at Liberty, until further Order, to enter into Bond for the Payment, as well of the Duty, commonly called the Old Subsidy, as of all the farther Duties due for such Tobacco, but without any Allowance for prompt Payment of the said Duty, commonly called the Old Subsidy, or any other of the Duties which were formerly payable in ready Money; and that if any Tobacco, which has been or shall be so imported, during the Continuance of this Order, from the Territories of the said United States, into the said Ports of London,

Bristol, Portsmouth, Cowes, Liverpool, Falmouth, Whitehaven, Hull, Greenock, and Port Glasgow, shall be afterwards taken, within the Time limited, out of the Warehouses wherein the same shall be secured under His Majesty's Locks, in Manner herein before directed, at either of the above Ports, to be exported directly from thence, the Bonds which have been or shall be entered into for Payment of the said Duties, shall be discharged in the Manner directed by the several Acts of Parliament in Force.

And in order to facilitate the carrying on Trade and Commerce between the People and Territories belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in the West Indies, including in that Description the Bahama Islands, and the Bermuda or Somers Islands, and the People and Territories belonging to the said United States of America, His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Hemp and Flax, Masts, Yards and Bowsprits, Staves, Heading, Boards, Timber, Shingles, and all other Species of Lumber; Horses, Neat Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, and all other Species of Live Stock and Live Provisions; Peas, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, Rice, Oats, Barley, and all other Species of Grain, being the Growth or Production of any of the said United States of America, may (until further Order) be imported by British Subjects, in British Built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any Port of the said United States of America, to any of His Majesty's West India Islands, the Bahama Islands, and the Bermuda or Somers Islands; and that Rum, Sugar, Melasses, Coffee, Cocoa-Nuts, Ginger and Pimento, may (until further Order) be exported by British Subjects, in British Built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any of the said Islands, to any Port or Place within the said United States, upon Payment of the same Duties on Exportation, and subject to the like Rules, Regulations, Securities and Restrictions, as the same Articles by Law are or may be subject and liable to, if exported to any British Colony or Plantation in America; and the Bonds and Securities heretofore required to be taken for such Ships carrying such Goods, shall and may be cancelled and discharged, upon the like Certificates as are required by the above recited Act to discharge any Bonds given in Great Britain for the due Landing any other Goods in the said United States of America.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

**W**HEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, That on Thursday the 15th Instant, a most considerable Quantity of Tea and Foreign Spirits was run on Shore near Christ Church, within the Limits of the Port of Southampton, from Two large Lug sail Vessels, by a numerous Gang of Smuglers, in Defiance of the Laws of the Revenue, and in Opposition to the Officers of His Majesty's Customs employed in the Execution thereof, who, notwithstanding their utmost Endeavours, were unable to resist so large a Body of desperate and armed Men:

That upon Information being received that the said Two Smuggling Vessels had taken Shelter in Christ Church Harbour, an Attempt was made, on the Evening of the said 15th Instant, by the Officers and Crew of His Majesty's Sloop of War the *Orestes*, in Conjunction with the Officers of the Swan Cutter, in the Service of the Customs, and of a Cutter in the Service of the Excise, in their respective Boats, manned and armed, to seize and take Possession of the said Smuggling Vessels:

That in the Execution of this Service they were most violently and forcibly resisted by a large Body of Smuglers, armed with Fire Arms and other offensive Weapons, who were assembled on board the said Vessels, and on Shore, for that Purpose, and who fired upon the Officers, and killed Mr. William Allen, the Master of the said Sloop of War the *Orestes*, (who, by virtue of a Commission from the Board of Customs, was likewise an Officer of that Revenue) and also dangerously wounded one of the Boat's Crew:

That the Officers however resolutely persevered in the Execution of their Duty, boarded and seized both the said Smuggling Vessels, and, after having taken Possession thereof, carried them into the Port of Coarves; but that the Persons concerned in this atrocious Outrage and Murder made their Escape.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned therein, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of the said Offenders (except the Person who actually fired and killed the said Mr. Allen) who shall discover his Accomplices, so that Two or more of them may be apprehended and convicted of the said Offence.

And, as a further Encouragement, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs do hereby offer a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person

or Persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, any Two or more of the said Offenders, to be paid by the Receiver-General of His Majesty's Customs upon Conviction.

And if any one of the said Offenders shall, within Three Months from the Date hereof, discover his Accomplices, so that two of them at least be apprehended and convicted of the said Offence, the Offender making such Discovery shall be entitled to the like Reward.

**W**HEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, That Two several Incendiary Letters, signed with the supposed fictitious Name of "Jack Oakham," dated "St. Catherine's, Wapping, July 18, 1784," one of them directed "To James Adair, Esq; Recorder of the City of London, Portugal-street near Lincoln's Inn Fields," the other to "Madam Adair, the Recorder's Wife," in the same Street, containing the most horrid Imprecations, and the most shocking and indecent Expressions, and threatening to murder the said James Adair, Esq; and his Wife, and to burn his House, were delivered by the Penny-Post Letter-Carrier at the House of the said James Adair, Esq; above-mentioned, on the 20th Day of this Instant July, and appear to be written with a View to obstruct the Course of Justice, by preventing the Execution of William Thompson, who is now under Sentence of Death in Newgate for Forgery:

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in writing and sending the Incendiary Letters above-mentioned, doth hereby promise His most Gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letters) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further Encouragement, His Majesty doth hereby offer a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person making such Discovery as aforesaid, (except as is before excepted) to be paid by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders.

**B**Y an Act of the last, and also of the present Session of Parliament, for establishing certain Regulations concerning the Portage and Conveyance of Letters and Packets by the Post between Great Britain and Ireland, to take Place on the 1st of August next, all Letters and Packets are to be charged and paid for according to the present Rates of Postage in Great Britain, and the Rates established by the Act of Parliament in Ireland, except to and from certain Persons who, by Virtue of the respective Offices in Great Britain and Ireland, now send and receive Letters and Packets free from the Duty of Postage, provided that all such Letters and Packets so sent shall relate to the Business of their respective Offices, and that there shall be certified on the Outside of such Letters and Packets,

under the Hand Writing of such Officers respectively to be On His Majesty's Service, and that such Letters and Packets shall be sealed with the Seal of the Office, or of Officer sending the same. And in Case any such Officers shall receive under Cover to them any Letters or Packets intended for or directed to other Persons, all such Officers are required to send the same to the General Post Office in London, or Dublin, in order that such Letters and Packets may be charged with the Duty of Postage; it being the true Intent and Meaning of this Act, that the Privilege of sending and receiving Letters and Packets by such Officers, shall extend to such Letters and Packets only, as relate to the Business of their respective Offices.

It is also enacted, That all Persons may send printed Votes, Proceedings in Parliament, and printed News Papers to and from Great Britain and Ireland, at the Rate of One Penny only for each printed Vote, Proceeding in Parliament, and each printed News Paper, in Covers open at Both Ends, to be paid when they are put into any Post Office in Great Britain; but the Penny need not be paid before hand upon Papers from Ireland, as it can be received on their Delivery in Great Britain.

It is likewise enacted, That His Majesty's Postmaster-General may authorize certain Persons to send and receive printed Votes, Proceedings in Parliament, and printed News Papers by the Post to and from Great Britain and Ireland, at the Rate of One Penny only for each printed Vote, and Proceeding in Parliament, and each printed News Paper, over and above the printed Price thereon.

All Persons therefore who wish to be supplied with News Papers for Ireland, or from Ireland for Great Britain, may have them regularly sent, by applying by Letter, or otherwise, to the Clerk of the Chester Road, at the General Post Office in London, or to the Postmaster of any Town in Great Britain, where a News Paper is printed; or to the Secretary of the General Post Office in Dublin.

The Price of a Paper six Times a Week, at 3d. each, with 1d. for the Postage, will be 5l. 4s. per Annum; an Evening Paper three Times a Week, 2l. 2s. per Annum, and so in Proportion for the London Gazettes, other Papers, &c. And by an Act passed in the last Session of the Parliament of Ireland, each British News Paper, &c. will in all Parts of Ireland be delivered at the Rate of 1d. Postage for each; all which, upon an Average, will be less than the Prices heretofore paid for News Papers furnished by the Public Offices in Great Britain and Ireland.
