Body of desperate and armed Men:
That upon Information being received that the said Two Smegling Vessels had taken Shelter in Christ Church Harbour, an Attempt was made, on the Evening of the said 15th Instant, by the Officers and Crew of His Majesty's Sloop of War the Orestes, in Con-junction with the Officers of the Swan Cutter, in the Service of the Customs, and of a Cutter in the Service of the Excise, in their respective Boats, manned and armed, to seize and take Possession of the said Smugling Veffels :

That in the Execution of this Service they were most violently and forcibly resisted by a large Body of Smuglers, armed with Fire Arms and other offenfive Weapons, who were affembled on board the faid Vef sils, and on Shore, for that Purpose, and who fired upon the Officers, and killed Mr. William Allen, the Master of the Said Sloop of War the Orestes, (who,

stagter of the Jaid Sloop of War the Orefles, (who, by virtue of a Commission from the Board of Customs, was likewise an Officer of that Revenue) and also dangerously wounded one of the Bout's Crew:

That the Officers however resolutely persevered in the Execution of their Duty, boarded and seized both the said Smugling Vessels, and, after having taken Possession thereof, carried them into the Port of Cowes; but that the Persons concerned in this atrocious Outrage and Murder made their Firsts.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned therein, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of the said Offenders (except the Person who askually first and killed the said Mr. Allen) who shall discover his Accomplices, So that Two or more of them may be apprehended and convicted of the laid Offence. And, as a farther Encouragement, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Eustoms do hereby offer a Renvard of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person

or Persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, any Two or more of the said Offenders, to be paid by the Receiver-General
