Naples: July 3. The British Squadron under the Command of Commodore Sir John Lindsay, confifting of the Trufty, Thetis, Andromache, Sphinx, and Rattlesnake, which failed from Leghorn the talk of June last, anchored in this Bay on the 17th. On hearing of its Arrival, the King of Naples was pleased to command that it thould be immediately admitted to Prattick, notwithstanding the Quarantine lately laid on all Ships from whatever Quarter

they come.

The King and Queen of Naples having previously fignified to the Commodore their Intention of honouring the Squadronswith a Visit; their Majesties fet out on the 24th in the Morning from the Galley Mole, attended by General Acton, and several other Officers of the Court, and by the Captains of the Squadron, in their respective Barges. As soon as their Majesties were at a little Distance from the Shore, all the Ships manned their Yards, except the Sphinx and Rattlesnake, which being dressed with Colours, displayed them at the same Instant the others manned; and after their Majetties were on board the Trully, all the Rest of the Squadron fired a Royal Salute. .

Their Majetties visited the Ship above and below, and then the King went into the Commodore's Barge, and visited all the other Ships of the Squadron, returning again to the Trufty. On leaving the Squadron their Majesties were saluted by all the Ships with 21 Guns each; and the Commodore with the Captains had the Honour of dining with their Majesties on Shore, and the following Day on board the King's Yacht, which, with Two of the King's Gallies, was dreffed with Colours after the English Manner, the English Flag being at the

Yacht's Foretopmail Head

At Dinner on board the Yacht their Sicilian Majesties drank to the Health of the King and Queen of Great Britain, when a Royal Salute was immediasely fired from the Yacht and the Two Gallies. Their Majesties, during the Dinner, were pleased repeatedly to express their Satisfaction at seeing an English Squadron in the Bay of Naples, and appeared definous by every Means in their Power to manifest their Friendship for His Britannick Majesty.

His Sicilian Majelly having fixed on Thursday the 1st of July to honour the Squadron again with his Presence, and to see a few Evolutions performed in the Bay, his Majesty, attended by General Acton and the Officers of the Court, arrived at the Time appointed; and the Ships being in all Respect's prepared and quite ready, slipped their Cables and failed in good Order about Eleven o'Clock, with a very fine Sea Breeze.

The Exercising of the Squadron began immediately; and fuch Manœuvres as could be performed by fo imall a Number of Ships, were executed at Half past Two o'Clock. His Majesty was pleased to ho-nour the Commodore with his Company at Dinner, when the Commodore took an Opportunity to drink the Queen's Health, and fired a Royal Salute from

the whole Squadron.

About Four o'Clock the Evolutions recommenced, and were continued until Half past Six, when the Ships refumed their former anchoring Stations in the Bay of Naples in The feveral Manceuvres of the Squadron were honoured with repeated Expressions of Applante, by his Sicilian Majelly, who testined a perfect Knowledge in every Part of that Bunnels. He was faluted on his coming on Board and going on Shore, by albehe Ships, with 21 Guns, each, and attended on both Occasions by the Captains in their

Barcelo, confiding of 130 Sail, left Carthagena on the 28th of last Month; and after remaining two Days in Sight of the Harbour, proceeded towards their Destination the 30th in the Evening. with a fair Wind. The Portuguese Squadron appeared on the 5th Instant, and was also detained by unfavourable Weather till the Morning of the 7th, when they pursued their Way with a Westerly Breeze towards Algiers. No Accounts have been fince received from Monsieur de Barcelo,
