The Queen's Palace, November 4. HE Earl Waldegrave had this Day the Honour to kiss the Queen's Hand, on being appointed Master of the Horse to Her Majesty, in the Room of his late Father, deceased.

Vienna, October 23, The Emperor arrived here this Afternoon in perfect Health.

Dublin Castle, Ostober 26.

HE following is his Grace the Lord Lieutenant's Answer to the Address of the Lord-Mayor, Sheriffs and Commons of the City of Dublin.

THE Expressions of your personal Regard and Pub-lic Approbation mast at all Times be bigbly acceptable, and are, are at the present Moment, peculiarly flattering, as they afford an encouraging Proof, that my Conduct has ever concurred with your genuine Opinions; and that whilst you praise a moderate, you expect a firm Administration.

I am confident that the Spirit and Zeal of the Magistracy for the Welfare and Dignity of this great City, will not suffer a Revival of the late disgraceful Outrages: You may rely upon a constant Exertion of my

I shall ever be cordially anxious to co-operate for your Gratification in such Objects as may appear to the Legislature to bawe a just and salutary Tendency. Your Wishes upon the Subject of Commercial Regulation wisely connect your natural Attention to the Welfare of this Kingdom, with a liberal Regard for the general Interests of the Empire, and must influence my warmest

My Attachment to our Constitution in Church and State, is as unalterable as yours can be; and I feel in the Assurance of your Support, the strongest Conviction of the Propriety, and Encouragement to hope for the Success of that decided Condust by which I shall ever study to consult the real Interests and Happiness of Ireland, in maintaining the Authority of the Legis lature, and the Security of the Protestant Establish-

Dublin Castle, October 25,

Saturday last being the Anniversary of the Irish Rebellion in 1641, his Grace the Lord Lieutenant proceeded in State to Christ Church, attended by several of the Nobility and Gentry, and escorted by a Squadron of Horse, where a Sermon, suitable to the Occasion, was preached by the Lord Bishop of Down and Connor. On his Grace's Return to the Castle, the Great Gons at the Salute Battery in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired, and an-

swered by Vollies from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn up in the Royal Square at the Barracks. And at Night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Rejoicings throughout the City.

Dublin Caftle, October 26, 1784.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of His Majesty's happy Accession to the Throne, in the Morning the Flag was displayed on Bedford Tower: At Noon the Great Guns at the Salute Battery in His Majesty's Park the Phœnix were fired Three Rounds. and answered by Vollies from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks: In the Evening a Play was given by his Grace the Lord Lieutenant for the Entertainment of the Ladies; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.
