Constantinople, Octob. 2. N the 9th of sugust last, arrived here the Palatine of Culm, Ambassador Extraordinary from the Crown of Poland, to ratifie the last concluded Peace. The next day he mide his Publick Entry with greater State and Solemnity. Some dayes after his Excellency had Audience of the Grand Visier, to whom he delivered Letters from the King and Chancell s of Poland. The first of September he was conducted to his Audience of the Goand Signior (having first sent the Presents he was charged with for the Grand Signior) palling from his House to the great Seraglio on Horseback; and having passed the second Court, where the Junisaries were in Arms, he was brought into the Hall of the Divan, accompanied only by eight of the principal persons of his Trains His Excellency found there the Grand Visier, and after a short Conference with him, was treased with Sweet-meats, &c. which done, Vells were distributed to the said eight persons attending his Excel-Tency, who was then conducted to the Chamber of the Grand Signior, having only with him his two Sons, the Secretary of the Embassy his chief Interpreter and two or three of the chief Officers belonging to the Straglio. The Audience performed, his Excellency was reconducted, and fince hath had several Conferences with the Grand Visier, upon the affairs of the two Nations. The same day the Deputies of Rigust had Audience, and presented the annual Tribute of that Repub-

Madrid, Decemb. 15. The 8th inflant dyel here the Marquis de l'ecde, on whom hi Majesty had sone dayes before conserred the charge of General of Battalia of his Armies. Don Hieronimo de Quinoners who was sent with the succors to Oran in Africa, is made Governor of Maiaza, in the room of the Murquis de Monroy. On Friday last Signior Fredrico Cornaro, Ambassidor from the Republick of Venice, made his publick Entry here.

Rome Decemb. 17. The matters in difference between the Spanish Ambissidor the Mirquis de Liche, and this Court, continue in the same state as formerly, the Ambaffador feeming refulved not-to quit his Pre-tentions, concerning the Priviledges he pretends due no him as Ambifiador, and the Pope not to allow them We have Letters from Sicily which inform us, that one of the Spanish Men of War, called the Conception of Naples, as it was Careening at Palermo, took fire, and was burnt. That the Marquis de Bigonne, General of the Gallies, was gone from Palermo to Nirles, because he would not be under the Orders of the Cudinal de Porto Carrero. That the Marquis de Villa Fiel bid teceived a Commission from Spain, to command the Kings Naval Forces in the absence of the Marquis de Bijonne. That Don Diego Bragamente had been difmissed from his Command of General of the Cavalty? and that it was believed he would be fent Prisoner to Madrid, being charged to have been the occasion of the disturbances which have happed at Catanea's

Venice, Decemb. 18. By feveral persons arrived from the Levast, we are affired that the Plague, and other Contagious distempers, which have very much raged in several parts of the Ottoman Territories, are of lace vosy much diminished; so that the Merchants hope they shall in a short time be able to renew their Commerce with those places. From Constantinople we have advice, that the Turkish Gallies having gathered the Contributions of the Illes under the Turkish obedisence, were returned thither, and that most of the Corfairs of Barbary, which Cruise in the Levint were gone into the Port; of which the Christians taking advantage, do at present very much disturb the Trade and Navigition of the Turks. That the Grand Vifier was fifting out a great many Gallies, and other Vessels, to be employed in the Black Sea against the Moscovites. The Prince and Princess of Radzeville are arrived here, and have had great Civilities shown them, by Order of the Senate.

i Genoua, Docemb. 18. After all the discourse concerning the intention of France to bring the War into Milan, the Spaniard's seem not very apprehensive of it, and look upon it only as an amusement, and that the design of the French therein is to give them an alarm, and to put them to an unnecessary charge on this side. From Thoulon we have certain advice, that they are preparing there a very great Convoy for Messina, and that the Duke de La Feuillade is to succeed the Duke de Vivonne, who has desired leave to return home, to look after his own particular affairs, which have suffered by his long absence.

Vienna, Decemb, 21. There is News at Court that the Grand Signior has deposed Abafti Prince of Tranfilvania, and hith given that Principality to another, who is more a Friend to the Emperor than Abafti was, which some look upon as done expresly to gratifie his Imperial Majesty, who was very much displeased with Abafti, because of the protection and assistance he gave to the Rebels, but others believe there was some other more po verful confideration which led the Port to make this change i for we are affured, that not withflanding . those many repeated affurances of the Grand Visier, that he would not give the least countenance to the faid, Rebels, they have had their Deputies very lately at Conflantinople, and that the Grand Vilier hath had often. Conferences with them.
