Copenhagen, January 31.

Yesterday was observed here as the Anniversary of the Birth-days of the King and the Prince Royal of Denmark, when the Court was extremely brilliant. The Grand Marshal gave a Dinner upon the Occasion, to which the Foreign Ministers were invited. A Ball in Gala followed in the Evening, and another in Domino is announced for Wednesday.

THE Commissioners appointed to carry into Execution an Act of Parliament passed in the Eleventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for consolidating, &c. the several Acts of Parliament for Paving, Cleansing, and Lighting the City of London and Liberties thereof, do hereby give Notice, that they will meet in the Council Chamber of the Guildhall, on Tuesday the 7th Day of March next, at Four o'Clock in the Afternoon, to let, by public Auction, a Lease for One Year from Lady-Day next, of the Tolls directed by the said Act to be paid before any Cattle or Carriage shall be permitted to pass on a Sunday through any or either of the Turnpikes hereafter mentioned, or through any Turnpike to be erected by Virtue of the said Act, or any other Act or Acts of Parliament near the same, viz.
