HE King has been pleased to present the Reverend Lambton Loraine, Batchelor of Laws, to the Rectory of Nelston, alias Nayleston, in the County of Leicester and Diocese of Lincoln, void by the Death of the Reverend Doctor Richard Bentley.

The King has been pleased to grant to Thomas Thomas, Esq; and his Issue, and to Barbara Thomas his Sister, His Royal Licence and Authority to take and bear the Surnames of Barrett Lennard, and also to bear the Arms of Lennard and Barrett Quarterly, as particularly described in the last Will of the late Right Honourable Thomas Barrett Lennard, Baron Dacre, deceased, such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office; and also to order that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.

HEREAS by an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, " An Act for fur-"ther continuing for a limited Time an Act made in the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for preventing certain Instruments from being required from Ships belonging to the United States of America; and " to give to His Majesty, for a limited Time, cer-"tain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and "Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's " Dominions and the Inhabitants of the faid United States; and for continuing for a limited Time an Att made in the Twenty-fourth Year of the Reign " of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act to ex-tend the Powers of an Act, made in the Twenty-third Year of His present Majesty, for giving His Majesty certain Powers for the better carrying on

" Majesty's Dominions, and the Inhabitants of the United States of America, to the Trade and Commerce of this Kingdom with the British Colonies " and Plantations in America, with Respect to cer-tain Articles therein mentioned," It is enacted, That the faid Acts, and all the Matters and Things therein contained, shall continue and be in Force until the 5th Day of April 1786: His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That any Rice, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, which hath been imported fince the 1st Day of January 1786, or shall be hereafter imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in pursuance of His Majesty's Order in Council dated the 8th of April 1785, may, upon the Importer paying down in ready Money the Duty commonly called the Old Subfidy (except as hereinafter excepted) be warehoused under His Majesty's Locks, in such Warehouse as shall be approved of for that Purpose by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them, upon the importer's own Bond for Payment of all further Duties due for such Rice, within Eighteen Months, according to the net Weight and Quantity of fach Rice at the Time it shall have been or shall be so landed; but it is His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheless, that upon the Importation of any such Rice into the Ports of London, Bristol, Portsmouth, Cowes, Liverpool, Lancaster, Falmouth, Poole, Whitehaven, Hull, Greenock and Port Glafgow, or either of them, in the Manner hereinbefore expressed, the Importer shall be at Liberty, until further Order, to enter into Bond for the Payment, as well of the Duty commonly called the Old Sub-fidy, as of all the further Duties due for such Rice, but without any Allowance for prompt Payment of the faid Duty commonly called the Old Subfidy, or any other of the Duties which were formerly payable in ready Money; and that if any Rice, which has been so imported fince the 1st Day of January 1786, or shall be hereafter imported during the Continu-"Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His ance of this Order, from the Territories of the said
