When we contemplate your Majesty in your domestic Capacity, with the subordinate Feelings of ourselves, first, as the tenderest and best of Husbands to the dearest, most exemplary, and most amiable of all Consorts; and next, as the Father of a numerous and illustrious Offspring, planning the Prosperity of each, and by Example as well as Precept promoting the Good of all, the Case is our own; we feel for ourselves, and our Hearts are wrung by our Thoughts.
