**AHE** following Address of the Bishop, Dean and Chapter, Archdeacons and other Clergy of the Diocefe of Chichefter, has been prefented to the King by His Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury: Which Addrefs His Majefty was pleafed to receive very gracioufly.

Moft Gracious Sovereign, T E, your Majefty's moft dutiful and loyal Sub-jects, the Bishop, Dean and Chapter, Archdeacons, and other Clergy of the Diocefe of Chichester, do, with all Humility, beg Leave to offer to your Majetty our most fincere Congratulations upon the Deliverance of your Sacred Perfon from a fudden unfulpected Danger, to which it was expoled by a late most daring and detestable Attempt against it; an Attempt which has fo juftly and fo generally alarmed the Fears of your faithful Subjects, and which, God be praifed, through the merciful Interpoial of His Providence, you have happily escaped. We cannot now but reflect with Pleafure upon all

the Advantages we enjoy under your Majefty's paternal Care and Protection, to which alone, under God, we are indebted for them; that the chief Object of your Attention is, like that of your Royal Anceftors, the fixing and preferving our Conftitution both in Church and State upon the firmeft Bafis, and by this Means connecting, what is fcarce ever united in other Kingdoms, the Honour, Influence and Profperity of your Government with the Happiness of your People.

Excited by these just Sentiments, it would be unpardonable in us not to take this public Opportunity of expressing our Joy and Thankfulness for the Pre-fervation of your Majesty's most valuable and important Life, and, of Course, the Continuance of our prefent Felicity, which we cannot but confider as involved in it.

May that God, whom you devoutly and fincerely ferve, and whole gracious Protection you have now fo fignally experienced, preferve you a long and shining Example of fincere Piety, and the pureft Morals, exercifed and maintained in the highest Station, make you a bleffed Inftrument in the Hands of His Providence to promote the fame virtuous and seligious Principles among your Subjects ; to establish the Freedom, Commerce and Security of your Country upon a durable and fure Foundation, and to dif-pense to a grateful and happy People every other Bleffing of a glorious and fuccelsful Reign.
