Mountains on the other fide of the Valley of Knitzig. The French have quite demolished the Callle and Town of Bufweyler, belonging to the Counts de Hanaw. The French Troops in these Parts are altogether quiet, their number is not very confiderable, fo that we may believe they will not move, till they receive a Reinforcement from Lorrain or Flanders. We expect every day to hear that the Duke of Lorrain is returned from Vienna to Wormes; it feems his Highness is still incommoded with the hurt he received some time since at Philipsburg, and particularly in one of his feet.

Cologne, March 22. Yesterday the Bishop of Gurek, the chief of the Imperial Embassy for the Treaty at Nimeguen, arrived here; it is faid his business is, to promote the defign which is in hand, to make the Duke of Neuburg's second Son Coadjutor to our Elector. The account we have from Maestricht is, that the French are preparing for some considerable Enterprize, which puts all these Parts into continual apprehensions, that they mean to visit them. The Letters we receive from above, confirm what we heard, of the Count de Caplieres being put out of his charge of Commissary General, and that for misemploying the monies defigned for the use of the Army; and that probably he might be called to a farther account, being commanded to Vienna, cannot hear that any confiderable recruits have been made for the Imperial Army this Winter, however the Officers fay, the Emperor will have a very good Army in the Field this Summer.

Aire, March 26. We have Letters from the Camp before Ipresslated yellerday in the afternoon, which fay, that the night before, the Besiegers attacked the Counterscarp of the Town and Cittadel at the same time, which after a flout refisfance on the part of the Befreged, and after having been once repulsed, they gained, having loft above 200 Men, and many Officers, and among them the Commander of the Regiment of Alface, and many Captains of Grenadiers; and the Prince de Harcourt, who served as the Kings Aide de Camp had his Leg broke, which it's thought will kill him. The next morning the Besseged desired to Capitulate, and when these Letters came away, one of the Gates was delivered up. The 26 his Majesty intended to part from the Camp for Lille, where he would rest two or three dayes, and then return wich the Queen towards St. Germains, where he is expected to arrive the 8th of the next month.

St Omer, March 27. Ipres is now in the hands of the French, though they lost a good many Men before it, as well through the stout resistance of the Besseged, as that the Attack of the Counterscarp being made in the night, our Men wounded one another with their own Fire.

Paris, Ma.cb 3q. Ipres, it feems, was surrendred the 26 in Riafter eight days of open Trenches, the Governor and Garilon having made a very brave defence; for when our Men attack ed the Counterscarp the 24 at night, they received them so briskly, that in the first Attack they were repulsed with the loss of many Men, as well common Soldiers as Officers, and, among others, the Prince of Hargeurs had his Leg broke with among others, the Prince of Harpour nau nis Leg ordice with a Grenado, and Monstean de Rioto, who commands the Kings. Grenadiers, was desperately wounded; but the Belingers renewing the Attack, at length made themselves Masters of the Counterscarp, upon which the Bosieged capitulated the next morning. The account we had of the Kings having put a Garison into Dixmuyde, is contradicted. The 26 past the Kings having the Counters Like and in some few days his Majesty came from the Camp to Lille, and in some few days his Majesty is expected at Si. Germans. In our last we told you, that the Prince of Conde had sent a Centloman, who, is frema; is an

Italian, that brought him certain Letters, to the Beftille ; he still remains there, and the Prince, as we are told, is resolved to discover the bottom of that matter.
