cution the Statute made in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of the late King Charles the Second, intitled, "An Act for the better Observation of the " Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday;" and also an Act of Parliament made in the Ninth Year of the Reign of the late King William the Third, intitled, "An Act for the more effectual suppressing of Blatpnemy and Profanenes;" and also an Act passed
in the Twenty-first Year of Our Reign, intitled, "An Act for preventing certain Abuses and Profanations on the Lord's Day, called Sunday," and all other Laws now in Force for the punishing and suppreffing any of the Vices aforefaid; and also to suppress and prevent all Gaming whatsoever in Publick or Private Houses on the Lord's Day; and likewise that they take effectual Care to prevent all Persons keeping Taverns, Chocolate-Houses, Coffee-Houses, or other Publick-Houses whatsoever, from selling Wine, Chocolate, Cossee, Ale, Beer, or other Liquors, or receiving or permitting Guests to be or remain in such their Houses, in the Time of Divine Service on the Lord's Day, as they will answer it to Almighty God, and upon Pain of Our highest Displeasure. And for the more effectual proceeding herein. We do hereby direct and command all Our Judges of Assize, and Justices of the Peace, to give ffrict Charge, at their respective Assizes and Sessions, for the due Profecution and Punishment of all Persons that shall presume to offend in any or the Kinds aforefaid, and also of all Persons that, contrary to their Dury, shall be remis or negligent in putting the said Laws in Execution; and that they do, at their re-fpective Affizes and Quarter Sellions of the Peace, cause this Our Royal Proclamation to be publickly read in open Court immediately before the Charge is given. And We do hereby further charge and command every Minister, in his respective Parish Church or Chapel, to read, or cause to be read, this Our Proclamation, at least Four Times in every Year, immediately after Divine Service; and to incite and flir up their respective Auditors to the Practice of Piety and Virtue, and the avoiding of all Immorality and Profaneness. And to the End that all Vice and Debauchery may be prevented, and Religion and Virtue practifed by all Officers, Private Soldiers, Mariners and others, who are employed in Our Service by Sea and Land, We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our Commanders and Officers whatsoever, that they do take Care to avoid all Profaneness, Debauchery and other Immoralities, and that, by their own good and virtuous Lives and Conversation, they do set good Examples to all such as are under their Care and Authority, and likewise take Care of and inspect the Behaviour of all such as are under them, and punish all those who shall be guilty of any of the Offences aforesaid, as they will be answerable for the ill Consequences of their Neglect herein.
