On the 21st of last Month died at Horsens, his Serene Highness Prince Alexis, youngest Son of the late Prince Anthony Ulrick, and First Cousin to his Serene Highness the Reigning Duke of Brunswick.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that in the Night of the 12th of December instant, between the Hours of Nine and Ten o'Clock, a Fire broke out in the Stables at Amphill Park in the County of Bedford, the Property of the Earl of Upper Ossory, by which Part of the said Stables was burnt down and consumed, and other Parts materially damaged; that during the Continuance of the said Fire, another Part of the said Stables, (totally unconnected) appeared to be in Flames; that as soon as the abovementioned Fire and Flames began to subside, the Mansion-House at a considerable Distance was discovered to have taken Fire; and that from the above Circumstances there are strong Reasons to suspect that the said Stables and Mansion-House were maliciously and wilfully set on Fire by some Person or Persons unknown.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in this atrocious Offence, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually set Fire to the said Stables or Mansion-House,) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted of the said Offence.
