Couraged, or even to learned. That the African Slave Trade is fuch a Traffic; and that this Meeting regards with Abhorrence, a Commerce productive of Oppreffion, Cruelty, and even Murder, upon Millions of our Fellow Creatures.

That this Meeting, though fully fentible of the Importance of Manufactures and Commerce to the real Interefts of this Nation, is yet too jealous of that Reputation which all honeft Men ought to defire, to wilh the Promotion of any Traffic, however lucrative, by Means inconfistent with Humanity or In-tegrity; and they are convinced moreover, that the Traffic in

Queftion is highly impolitic as well as inhuman. That it is extremely defirable to call the Attention of Parlia-ment to thia unjustifiable Traffic, by Petitions from the People at large.

That it is expedient to prefent a Petition with this View, from the Town and Neighbourhood of Manchefter. That a circular Letter be addreffed, on Behalf of this Meet-ing, to the Mayor, or other chief Magiftrate, of every princi-cipal Town throughout Great Britain, requefting their Concurrence in a fimilar Measure.

That in order to procure the general and final Abolition of the African Slave Trade, it will be highly expedient to extend Information on this important Subject to every Part of Europe. That this Meeting approves of the Steps which have been taken in Manchefter, by the Boroughreeve, Conftables, and other Gentlemen, who have hitherto interefted themfelves in this Birgarfo. this Bufinefs.

That the Society formed in London, for the Purpofe of effetting the Abolition of the Slave Trade, having been the Firft to come forward as a Body in this Kingdom, in Favour of the opprefied Africans, are entitled to the particular Thanks of this Meeting, and of every other Friend to this Caufe of Humanity,

for a Conduct fo differentiated and fo laudable. That the further Sum of One Hundred Guincas, out of the Money fubfcribed in Manchefter, be tranfmitted to the Committee of that Society, in Aid of their truly benevolent Exertions.

That these Resolutions be immediately published in such a Manner, as fhall infure their Circulation throughout the King-doms of Great Britain and Ireland. THOMAS WALKER.
