HIS Day the Lords being met, a Meffage was fent to the Honourable Houfe of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Ufher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majefly's Commiffion, for declaring His Royal Affent to feveral Affs agreed upon by both Houfe, do defire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable Houfe in the Houfe of Peers, to bear the Commiffion read; and the Commons being come thither, the faid Commiffion, impowering His Royal Highnefs the Prince of Wales, the Lord Archbifhop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancelfor of Great Britain, the Lord Prefident of the Council, and feveral other Lords, to declare and notify the Royal Affent to the faid Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Affent given to

## Whitehall, March 111

The King has been pleafed to order a Congé d'Elire to país the Great Seal, empowering the Dean and Chapter of Chrift Church, in the Univerfity of Oxford, to choofe a Bifhop of that See, the fame being void by the Translation of the Right Reverend Father in God John late Bifhop thereof to the See of Hereford; and His Majefty has also been

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pleafed, by His Royal Sign Manual; to recommend to the faid Dean and Chapter the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor Edward Smallwell, now Bishop of St. David's; to be by them elected Bishop of the faid See of Oxford.

The King has been pleafed to grant to John Patton; of Stokefley, in the County of York, Gentleman; and the Heirs Malë of his Body, His Royal Licence and Authority to take upon him and them the Surname of Mafterman, and alfo to bear the Arms of Mafterman, in Compliance with the Request of Mathew Mafterman, of Great Ayton; in the County of York, Gentleman, Uncle of the faid John Patton ; fuch Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office; and alfo to order that this His Majefly's Conceffion and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.

## Vienna; February 27.

Letters of the 19th Inflant, from the Imperial Army in Cröatia, mention that, after having taken the Fort of Dreffnick, the Troops were flationed on the Korona, near that Fort, with their right Wing extended to the Feet of the Mountains of Pliffivicza; by which Means the Roads and Paffes to Bihach are opened.

opened. That during the Attack of Drefinick, a Detachment was fent to fummon the Turks posted at Sturlich to furrender. They invited the Commanding Officer to approach within Fifty Paces on Patole, when they made fo brisk a Fire on the Detachment as to kill Fifty Men, which fo enraged the Imperialists that they put the whole Turkish Garrison to Death.

That the Imperial Troops had made an unfuccelsful Attempt on Dubitza, in which they fuffered a Lofs of 82 killed and 349 wounded. That Emigrations of Turkish Families into the

That Emigrations of Turkish Families into the Austrian Territories, with their Cattle and Effects, were very frequent; and that the Turkish Troops had endeavoured in vain to prevent them.

By Advices from Sclavonia of the 18th Inflant, it appears that 130 Boats belonging to the Turks have been either taken or funk in the Save.
