Westminster, March 20.

THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, the Lord President of the Council, and several other Lords, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

An Act for removing any Doubt respecting the Power of the Commissioners for the Affairs of India to direct that the Expence of raising, transporting and maintaining such Troops as may be judged necessary for the Security of the British Territories and Possessions in the East Indies should be defrayed out of the Revenues arising from the said Territories and Possessions, and for limiting the Application of the said Revenues in the Manner therein mentioned.

An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, made in the Fifteenth Year of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, An Act to prevent the Counterfeiting of Gold and Silver Lace, and for settling and adjusting the Proportions of fine Silver and Silk, and for the better making of Gold and Silver Thread.

An Act for pulling down the Church of St. James at Clerkenwell in the County of Middlesex, and for building a new Church, and making a new Church Yard or Cemetery in the said Parish, with convenient Avenues and Passages thereto.

An Act for enlarging and varying some of the Powers contained in certain Acts of Parliament, relating to the watching, lighting and cleansing the Streets and other Places within the Town of Liverpool, and for removing and preventing Nuisances and Annoyances therein.

An Act for more effectually draining and preserving certain Fen Lands and Low Grounds in the Manor or Township of North Kyme in the County of Lincoln.

An Act for enabling the Right Honourable George Earl Brooke and Earl of Warwick to build a new Bridge over the River Avon in the Borough of Warwick, and to open proper Roads and Ways thereto.

An Act for reviving, continuing and enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act, made in the Fifth Year

of the Reign of His present Majesty King George the Third, for repairing and widening the Road from the Alyreton Turnpike Road, near a Place called Little Robins, in the Parish of Mansfield, in the County of Nottingham, through Woolley Moor to the Nottingham Turnpike Road, near Tansley, in the County of Derby; and from Woolley Moor to the Chesterfield Turnpike Road at Kelfstidge, in the said County of Derby.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act, passed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty King George the Third, for repairing and widening the Road from the Mansfield and Chesterfield Turnpike Road, near the Nine Mile Stone from Mansfield, through Temple-Normanton, Tupton New Inclosure, and Birkin Lane, to Buntingfield Nook, in the Parish of Ashover, in the County of Derby.

An Act for enlarging and altering the Terms and Powers of Two Acts of Parliament, made in the Twentieth and Twenty-sixth Years of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, for repairing the Road leading from Catterick Bridge in the County of York to Yarm in the said County, and from thence to Stockton in the County of Durham, and from thence through Seazefield in the said County of Durham to the City of Durham, and for reducing the said Acts into one, and for the more effectually repairing and keeping in Repair the said Road.

An Act for continuing the Term, and enlarging the Powers of an Act, passed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing and widening the Road from the Cross, or Market Place, in the Town of Wimborne Minster, to the Cross, or Market Place, in the Town of Blandford Forum, in the County of Dorset.

AT the Court at St. James's, the 19th of March, 1788,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WH-E-R-E-A-S by an Act made in the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for preventing certain Instruments from being required from Ships belonging to the United States of America; and to give to His Majesty, for a limited Time, certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the said United States;" which said Act has been continued by several subsequent Acts until the Fifth Day of April, 1788. And whereas by an Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to extend the Powers

“ Powers of an Act, made in the Twenty-third Year of His present Majesty, for giving His Majesty certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the United States of America, to the Trade and Commerce of this Kingdom with the British Colonies and Plantations in America, with Respect to certain Articles therein mentioned,” the Powers given by the said recited Act were extended to the Trade and Intercourse between this Kingdom and the British Colonies and Plantations in America, so far as the same might relate to Iron, Hemp and Sailcloth, and other Articles of the Produce of any Place bordering on the Baltic, which might be exported from this Kingdom; which last mentioned Act has also by several subsequent Acts been continued until the said 5th Day of April, 1788.

And whereas by another Act passed in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, “ An Act to continue the Laws now in Force for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, so far as the same relate to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the Inhabitants of the Countries belonging to the said United States;” it is declared to be expedient that the said Act of the Twenty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, so far only as the same extends to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the People and Territories belonging to the United States of America; and also that the said Act of the Twenty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign should be further continued and be in Force; and it is thereby enacted, That the said Act shall continue and be in Force until the 5th Day of April, 1789; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That any Unmanufactured Goods and Merchandizes, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law, (except Fish, Oil, Blubber, Whale-Fins and Spermacei) and any Pig Iron, Bar Iron, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Rosin, Pot-Ash, Pearl-Ash, Indico, Masts, Yards and Bowsprits, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, may until further Order) be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, either in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, or in Ships built in the Countries belonging to the United States of America, or any of them, and owned by the Subjects of the said United States, or any of them, and whereof the Master and Three-fourths of the Mariners at least are Subjects of the said United States, or any of them; and may be entered and landed in any Port of this Kingdom, upon Payment of the same Duties as the like Sort of Goods or Merchandize are or may be subject and liable to if imported in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any British Island or Plantation in America, and no other, notwithstanding such Goods or Merchandize, or the Ships in which the same may be brought, may not be accompanied with the Certificates or other Documents heretofore required by Law. And it is hereby further ordered, that there shall be the same Drawbacks and Bounties on Merchandizes and Goods exported from Great Britain into the Territories of the said United States of America, or any of them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law, upon the Exportation of the like

Goods or Merchandize to any of the Islands, Plantations, or Colonies, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in America; and that (until further Order) there shall be allowed and paid the same Drawbacks on the Exportation of any Sort of Foreign Hemp or Foreign Iron exported from Great Britain into any British Colony or Plantation in America, or into the Territories of the United States of America, or any of them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law upon the Exportation of the like Sort of Hemp or Iron, and under the same Rules, Regulations, Restrictions, Penalties and Forfeitures in all Respects, as such Drawbacks are allowed and paid, or are subject and liable to by Law, upon the Exportation of such Hemp and Iron into other Foreign Parts.

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, That any Tobacco, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the said United States of America, may (until further Order) be imported, in Manner before-mentioned, upon Payment of the same Duties as Tobacco imported by British Subjects from any British Colony or Plantation is or may hereafter be subject to; but under and subject nevertheless to all and singular the Regulations of an Act made and passed in the Twenty-fifth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, “ An Act for the better securing the Duties payable on Tobacco.”

And His Majesty is further pleased to order, That any Rice, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, which shall be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in Manner above-mentioned, may, upon the Importer paying down, in ready Money, the Duty of Eight pence the Hundred Weight, being Part of the Duties now payable on the Importation of Rice, be landed and warehoused (except as hereinafter excepted) under His Majesty's Locks, in such Warehouses as shall be approved of for that Purpose by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them, upon the Importer's own Bond for Payment of the Remainder of the Duties due and payable for such Rice, within Eighteen Months, according to the net Weight and Quantity of such Rice at the Time it shall be so landed: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheless, that upon the Importation of any such Rice into the Ports of London, Bristol, Portsmouth, Cowes, Liverpool, Lancaster, Falmouth, Poole, Whitehaven, Hull, Greenock, and Port Glasgow, or either of them, in the Manner herein before expressed, the Importer shall be at Liberty, (until further Order) to enter and land the same without Payment of any Duty whatever; in which Case such Rice shall be warehoused under the joint Locks of His Majesty and the Proprietors, in such Warehouse or Warehouses as shall be approved for that Purpose, by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them; every Expence attending which warehousing shall be borne by the said Proprietors, and that such Proprietor or Proprietors, or his or their known Agent, shall from Time to Time, in all reasonable Hours, as Occasion may require, have free Access to such Warehouses, for the Purpose of skreening and shifting the Rice, to prevent its receiving Damage, in the Presence of some proper Officer of the Customs. And that if any Rice which shall be so imported from the Territories of the said United States into either of the Ports abovementioned respectively, and warehoused as aforesaid, shall be taken out of the Warehouses wherein the same shall be secured, under the joint Locks of His Majesty and the Proprietors as aforesaid, for Home Consumption,

sumption, the full Duties due and payable upon the Importation of such Rice into this Kingdom for Home Consumption, shall, previously to its being taken out of such Warehouses, be paid to the Collector of His Majesty's Customs at the Ports where such Rice shall be so warehoused; but that such Proprietor, if he intends to export such Rice, shall have Liberty to export the same from such Warehouses respectively, under the usual Regulations, without Payment of any Duty whatever; and that if any Rice which shall have been imported into any Port of this Kingdom, not herein before specially named, and shall have been warehoused upon the Importer's Bond in Manner aforesaid, shall, within the Time herein before mentioned, be taken out of the Warehouse wherein it shall have been so secured, to be exported directly from thence, the Bond entered into for the Payment of the said Duties thereon shall be discharged in like Manner as Bonds entered into for the Duties upon Tobacco, are directed to be discharged by any Act of Parliament in Force.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
