The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

W HEREAS by an Act made in the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of His prefent Majefty, intituled, "An Act for preventing certain "Inftruments from being required from Ships "belonging to the United States of America; " and to give to His Majefty, for a limited "Time, certain Powers for the better carrying " on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects " of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants " of the faid United States;" which faid Act has been continued by feveral fubfequent Acts until the Fifth Day of April, 1788. And whereas by an Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of His prefent Term and Powers of an Act, made in the Fifth Year | Majefty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to extend the " Powers " Powers of an Act, made in the Twenty-third " Year of His prefent Majelty, for giving His Ma-× 1 jefty certain Powers for the better carrying on " Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of " His Majefty's Dominions and the Inhabitants " of the United States.of America, to the Trade " and Commerce of this Kingdom with the British " Colonies and Plantations in America, with Re-" spect to certain Articles therein mentioned,' the Powers given by the faid recited Act were ex-tended to the Trade and Intercourse between this Kingdom and the British Colonies and Plantations in America, fo far as the fame might relate to Iron, Hemp and Sailcloth, and other Articles of the Produce of any Place bordering on the Baltic, which might be exported from this Kingdom; which last mensioned Act has also by several subfequent Acts been continued until the faid 5th Day April, 1788. of

And whereas by another Act passed in this prefent Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to continue " the Lawsnow in Force for regulating the Trade be-" tween the Subjects of His Majeffy's Dominions " and the Inhabitants of the Territories belonging " to the United States of America, fo far as the .44 fame relate to the Trade and Commerce carried .se on between this Kingdom and the Inhabitants " of the Countries belonging to the faid United " States;" it is declared to be expedient that the faid Act of the Twenty-third Year of His prefent Majesty's Reign, fo far only as the fame extends to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the People and Territories belonging to the United States of America; and also that the faid Act of the Twenty-fourth Year of His Majefty's Reign fhould be further continued and be in Force ; and it is thereby enacted, That the faid Act fhall continue and be in Force until the 5th Day of April, 1789; His Majefty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That any Unmanufactured Goods and Merchandizes, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law, (except Fish, Oil. Blubber, Whale-Fins and Spermaceii) and any Pig Jron, Bar Iron, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Rofin, Pot-Afh, Pearl-Afh, Indico, Maffs, Yards and Bowfprits, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, may until further Order) be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, either in British built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, or in Ships built in the Countries belonging to the United States of America, or any of them, and owned by the Subjects of the faid United States, or any of them, and whereof the Master and Three-fourths of the Mariners at least are Subjects of the faid United States, or any of them; and may be entered and landed in any Port of this Kingdom, upon Payment of the fame Duties as the like Sort of Goods or Merchandize are or may be fubject and liable to If imported in British-built Ships, owned by His Majefty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any British Island or Plantation in America, and no other, notwithstanding fuch Goods or Merchan-dize, or the Ships in which the fame may be brought, may not be accompanied with the Certificates or other Documents heretofore required by Law. And it is hereby further ordered, that there shall be the fame Drawbacks and Bounties on Merchandizes and Goods exported from Great Britain into the Territories of the faid United States of Ame-rica, or any of them, as are or may hereafter

Goods or Merchandize to any of the Islands, Plantations, or Colonies, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in America; and that (until further Order) there shall be allowed and paid the same Drawbacks on the Exportation of any Sort of Foreign Hemp or Foreign Iron exported from Great Britain into any British Colony or Plantation in America, or into the Territories of the United States of America, or any of them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law upon the Exportation of the like Sort of Hemp or Iron, and under the fame Rules, Regulations, Rettrictions, Penalties and Forfeitures in all Respects, as such Drawbacks are allowed and paid, or are fubject and liable to by Law, upon the Exportation of fuch Hemp and Iron into other Foreign Parts.

And His Majeity is hereby further pleafed to or-der, That any Tobacco, being the Growth or Pro-duction of any of the Territories of the faid United States of America, may (until further Order) be imported, in Manner before-mentioned, upon Payment of the fame Duties as Tobacco imported by British Subjects from any British Colony or Plantation is or may hereafter be subject to; but under and fubject neverthelefs to all and fingular the Regulations of an Act made and paffed in the Twentyfifth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majefty, intituled, " An Act for the better fecuring the Duties payable on Tobacco."

And His Majesty is further pleased to order, That any Rice, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, which shall be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in Manner above-mentioned, may, upon the Importer paying down, in ready Money, the Duty of Eight pence the Hundred Weight, being Part of the Duties now payable on the Importation of Rice, be landed and warehouled (except as hereinafter excepted) under His Majefty's Locks, in fuch Warehoufes as shall be approved of for that Purpose by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them, upon the Importer's own Bond for Payment of the Remainder of the Duties due and payable for fuch Rice, within Eighteen Months, according to the net Weight and Quantity of fuch Rice at the Time it shall be so landed : But it is His Majesty's Pleasure neverthelefs, that upon the Importation of any fuch Rice into the Ports of London, Briftol, Portfmouth, Cowes, Liverpool, Lancaster, Falmouth, Poole, Whitehaven, Hull, Greenock, and Port Glafgow, or either of them, in the Manner herein before expressed, the Importer shall be at Liberty, (until further Order) to enter and land the fame without Payment of any Duty whatever; in which Cafe fuch Rice shall be warehoused under the joint Locks of His Majesty and the Proprietors, in fuch Warehoufe or Warehouses as shall be approved for that Purpose, by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them ; every Expence attending which warehousing shall be borne by the faid Proprietors, and that fuch Proprietor or Proprietors, or his or their known Agent, shall from Time to Time, in all feasonable Hours, as Occasion may require, have free Access to such Warehouses, for the Purpole of skreening and shifting the Rice, to prevent its receiving Damage, in the Prefence of fome proper Officer of the Cuftoms. And that if any Rice which shall be fo imported from the Territories of the faid United States into either of the Ports abovementioned respectively, and warehoused as aforesaid, shall be taken out of the Warehouses wherein the same shall be fecured, under the joint Locks of His Majefty be allowed by Law, upon the Exportation of the like | and the Proprietors as aforefaid, for Home Confumption,

fumption, the full Duties due and payable upon the Importation of fuch Rice into this Kingdom for Home Confumption, shall, previously to its being taken out of such Warehouses, be paid to the Collector of His Majefty's Cuftoms at the Ports where fuch Rice shall be fo warehoused ; but that fuch Proprietor, if he intends to export fuch Rice, thall have Liberty to export the fame from fuch Warehoufes respectively, under the usual Regulations, without Payment of any Duty whatever; and that if any Rice which shall have been imported into any Port of this Kingdom, not herein before specially named, and shall have been warehoused upon the Importer's Bond in Manner aforefaid, shall, within the Time herein before mentioned, be taken out of the Warehouse wherein it shall have been so secured, to be exported directly from thence, the Bond entered into for the Payment of the faid Duties thereon shall be discharged in like Manner as Bonds entered into for the Duties upon Tobacco, are directed to .be discharged by any Act of Parliament in Force.
