

Custom-House, London; March 5, 1789.

Whereas the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the Twenty-fifth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for the better securing the Duties payable on Tobacco," were required to fix and appoint a certain Place for the Purpose of Mooring every Ship or Vessel arriving with Tobacco on Board within this Port:

And whereas the said Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs did, pursuant to the Directions of the said Act, by Advertisement dated 28th December, 1785, fix and appoint the Tiers at Iron Gate within this Port, for the Purpose of mooring Ships or Vessels laden with Tobacco:

And whereas for Want of a sufficient Depth of Water the said Tiers at Iron Gate have been found inconvenient, and in many Cases improper:

The said Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs do therefore hereby give Notice to all Merchants, Owners, Masters, Pilots and others concerned, that from and after the 5th Day of April next, all such Ships and Vessels are hereby ordered and directed to be moored at the Tiers off Gun Dock and Wapping Old Stairs, and not to depart therefrom until regularly cleared by the proper Officer or Officers of His Majesty's Customs, under the Penalty of FIFTY POUNDS; and immediately on such Vessels having been so cleared, they are to be removed from the said Tiers, that they may not interrupt others arriving with Tobacco.

By an Act passed in the Seventh Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, no Person will be entitled to vote at the said Election, who shall not have been Six Calendar Months possessed in his own Right of the Stock for which he shall then give his Vote, unless the said Stock shall have been acquired, or shall have come by Bequest, or by Marriage, or by Succession to an Intestate's Estate, or by the Custom of the City of London; or by any Deed of Settlement after the Death of any Person who shall have been entitled for Life to the Dividends of such Stock.
