THIS Morning, at about Nine o'Clock, Their Majesties, and their Royal Highnesses the Princesses, set out from Exeter, and arrived at this Seat, in perfect Health, at Half after Three this Afternoon.]

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Common Council of the City of Exeter, in Chamber assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Common Council of this your Majesty's antient City of Exeter, beg Leave to pay our Duty to your Majesty, on your Arrival in this Part of your Kingdom, and to express our humble Thanks for your Majesty's gracious Condescension, in honoring this City with your Presence.

Your Majesty's faithful Citizens of Exeter have eagerly embraced every Opportunity of standing forward, and giving every Proof of their Loyalty and of their Zeal in Support of your Majesty's Government; but it is peculiarly grateful to them to be permitted to approach your Royal Person, and in this august Presence to testify their Duty and their Loyalty to your Majesty, their firm and unalterable Attachment to your Majesty's most illustrious Family, and their Veneration for those Virtues, which add Lustre and Dignity to the most exalted Station.

Your Majesty will, here, as in every other Part of your Majesty's Dominions, perceive, that there is but one Mind amongst all Ranks of your Subjects. The earnest Wishes of the Nation are united, and they are all directed, to the Support of the Honor of your Crown, the Preservation of your Majesty's Life and Health, and to your Attainment of every public and domestic Happiness, as your Majesty's gracious Endeavours are, and always have been, directed to the Liberty, the Security, and the Prosperity of your People.

The many essential Advantages we derive and daily experience from the Administration of your Majesty's auspicious Government, cannot but make us anxious for the Continuance of it. We are thankful for the great Blessing, which, under Divine Providence, we have lately received; and rejoice in the present happy Prospect, that your Majesty's Life may be lengthened for many Years to come; and that the favoured People of this Nation will long possess the Happiness and Advantage of contemplating your Majesty's illustrious Character, which, as it is the highest in Rank and Dignity, is also the first in affording to the World an eminent Example of all the Duties and Virtues of public and private Life.
