and it allords me peculiar Satisfaction that I enter upon the Difcharge of this molt important Trust at a Period when this Country, in common with the reft of His Majefty's Dominions, is in the secure Enjoyment of the Bieffings of Peace, and of the ineffimable Advantages arising from our free Conflicution.

This happy Situation will undoubtedly encourage you to perfevere in the Maintenance of good Government, and to adhere to that wife Syftem of Policy, which has effablifhed the Credit, the Industry, and the Profperity of your Country upon a firm and fleady Foundation.

Gentleman of the Houfe of Commons,

I have ordered the National Accounts to be laid before you, and I truft you will make fuch Provisions as shall be necessary for the Exigencies of the State, and the honourable Support of His Majefty's Government.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

Your Zeal for the Interefts of this Country will naturally direct your Attention to whatever can increafe the Wealth and extend the Industry of Ireland. Her Agriculture and Linen Manufacture will claim your efpecial Care, and the Inflitutions of the Charter and other Protestant Schools will, I am perfuaded, receive from you that Confideration which the Interefts of Religion, and the good Education of Youth, peculiarly demand. I earneftly recommend to your Attention the improving and continuing fuch Laws as Experience hath fhewn to be of National Benefit; and I have the King's Commands to affure you, that fuch Meafures, as may contribute to that End, will meet with His Majefty's most gracious Concurrence.

Imprefied with a deep Senfe of the diffinguished Honour which His Majefty has conferred upon me by my Appointment to this arduous Situation, I fhall endeavour, with the utmost Zeal and Attention, to promote the Happiness and Welfare of Ireland; fully fensible, that I cannot otherwise hope either to render my Services acceptable to my Sovereign, or to enfure your favourable Opinion and Confidence.

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His Majefty, by His Royal Letters, bearing Date the 16th Day of July, 1789, having appointed Richard Longfield, Efq; to be of His Moft Honourable Privy Council of this Kingdom, he this Day in Council took the usual Oaths, and his Place at the Board accordingly.

Whitehall, January 26.

A S feveral Artificers and Manufacturers, Su²jess of Great Britain, have fom Time to Time gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their feveral Callings, contrary to the Laws of thele Kingdoms; the following Abstracts of Acis of Parliament of their lase Majestics, King Geerge the First and Second, and of His prefent Niojesty, for preventing such Practices, are published for the Information of all Perfors who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Dischedience to them.—And it will be observed, that fuch Penalties likewise extend to these woods are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themfelves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

T any Períon shall contract with, entice, or folicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brafs, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries, out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof upon Indictment or Information, in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Affizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Perfon having been once convicted, shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Difcretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being fuch Artificers, fhall go into any Country out of His Majefty's Dominions, to exercife or teach the faid Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any fuch Foreign Country, exercifing any of the faid Trades, fhall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambaffador, Minifter or Conful of Great Britain, in the Country where fuch Artificers fhall be, or by any Perfon authorifed by fuch Ambaffador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm ; fuch Perfons fhall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Adminifirator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Defcent, Devife or Purchafe; and fhall forfeit all Lands. Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majefty's Ufe, and fhall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majefty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made upon Oath before any Jultice of Peace that any Perfon is endeavouring to feduce any fuch Artificer, or that any fuch Artificer hath contracted, or is preparing to go out of His Majefly's Dominions, for the Purpofes aforefaid; fuch Juffice may fend his Warrant to bring the Perfon complained of before him, or before fome other Juffice; and if it thall appear by the Oath of one Witnefs, or by Confeffion, that he was guilty of any of the faid. Offences, fuch Juffice may bind him to appear at the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions: And if fuch Perfon thall refue to give Security, the Juffice may commit him to Goal till the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions, and until he thall be
