

General Post-Office, March 1, 1790.

THE Post-Boy carrying the Mail from Penrith to Keswick on the 25th past, was attacked by a Man on Foot, near Ten o'Clock at Night, upon Flusco Common, about Four Miles from Penrith, and robbed of his Horse, and the Mail, containing the Bags of Letters from hence of Tuesday the 23d, for the following Places, viz.

Keswick, Workington, and
Cockermouth, Whitehaven,
And the Bye-Letters for those Towns.

The Person who committed this Robbery was dressed in a Blue Jacket, with White Binding, a Pair of Corduroy Breeches, and dark Brown Stockings; is about Five Feet Eight Inches high, and appeared to be an Irishman.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person, whether an Accomplice in the said Robbery or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery whereby the Person who committed the same may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of the Party, be entitled to the same Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, and will also receive His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.

On Thursday the 25th and Friday the 26th of this Month, to Admirals, Captains, and their Attornies;
On Saturday the 27th and Monday the 29th, to Lieutenants and their Attornies;

And on Tuesday the 30th to Masters and Surgeons: After which the List will be recalled the First and Third Wednesdays in every Month, that all Persons may then and there attend to receive what may become payable to them, and not only bring with them the Affidavit required, touching their not having enjoyed the Benefit of any Public Employ, either at Sea or on Shore, during the Time they are to be paid their Half-Pay, but also to produce Certificates that they have subscribed to the Test, and taken the Oaths of Allegiance required by Act of Parliament to His present Majesty; and in case any of the said Sea-Officers

should not be able to attend themselves, but employ Attornies for that Purpose, that the said Attornies do produce the like Certificates and Affidavits from the Persons they are employed by.

Where Officers are Abroad on Leave, their Agents are to produce attested Copies of such Leave, before the Half-Pay can be paid.
