Goods or Merchandize to any of the Illands, Plantations, or Colonies, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in America; and that (until further Order) there shall be allowed and paid the same Drawbacks on the Exportation of any Sort of Foreign Hemp or Foreign Iron exported from. Great Britain into any British Colony or Plantation in America, or into the Territories of the United States of America, or any of them, as are or may hereafter be allowed by Law upon the Exportation of the like Sort of Hemp or Iron, and under the fame Rules, Regulations, Reflrictions, Penalties and Forfeitures in all Respects, as such Drawbacks are allowed and paid, or are fubject and liable to by Law, upon the Exportation of fuch Hemp and Iron into other Foreign Parts.

And His Majefty is hereby further pleafed to or. der, That any Tobacco, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the faid United States of America, may (until further Order) be imported, in Manner before-mentioned, upon Payment of the fame Duties as Tobacco imported by British Subjects from any British Colony or Plantation is or may hereafter be subject to; but under and subject nevertheless to all and singular the Regulations of an Act made and paffed in the Twentyninth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majefty, in-tituled, "An Act for repealing the Duties on Tobacco and Snuff, and for granting new Duties in Lieu thereof."

And His Majefty is further pleafed to order, That any Rice, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the United States of America, which shall be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, in Manner above-mentioned, may, upon the Importer paying down, in ready Money, the Duty of Eight pence the Hundred Weight, being Part of the Duties now p yable on the Importation of Rice, be landed and warehoused (except as hereinafter excepted) under His Majefly's Locks, in fuch Warehoufes as shall be approved of for that Purpole by the Commissioners of His Majefty's Cuftoms, or any Four or more of them, upon the Importer's own Bond for Payment of the Remainder of the Duties due and payable for such Rice, within Eighteen Months, according to the net Weight and Quantity of such Rice at the Time it shall be fo landed : But it is His Majesty's Pleasure neverthelefs, that upon the Importation of any fuch Rice into the Ports of London, Briltol, Portfmouth, Cowes, Liverpool, Lancaster, Falmouth, Poole, Whitehaven, Hull, Greenock, and Port Glafgow, or either of them, in the Manner herein before expressed, the Importer shall be at Liberty, (until further Order) to enter and land the fame without Payment of any Duty whatever; in which Cafe fuch Rice shall be warehoused under the joint Locks of His Majefty and the Proprietors, in fuch Warehoufe or Ware houses as shall be approved for that Purpose, by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, or any Four or more of them ; every Expence attending which warehousing shall be borne by the faid Proprietors, and that fuch Proprietor or Proprietors, or his or their known Agent, thall from Time to Time, at all feafonable Hours, as Occafion may require, have free Accefs to fuch Warehouses, in the Prefence of fome proper Officer of the Cultoms, for the Purpole of ikreening and thifting the Rice, to prevent its receiving Damage. And that if any Rice which shall be fo imported from the Territories of the faid United States into any of the Ports abovementioned respectively, and warehoused as aforefaid, shall be taken out of the Warehoufes wherein the fame fhall

be fecured, under the joint Locks or rus a geny and the Proprietors as aforefaid, for Home Consumption; the full Duties due and payable upon the Importation of fuch Rice into this Kingdom for Home Confumption, shall, previously to its being taken out of fuch Warehouses, be paid to the Collector of His Majefty's Cuftoms at the Ports where fuch Rice shall be fo warehoused ; but that such Proprietor, if he intends to export fuch Rice, shall have Liberty to export the fame from fuch Warehoufes respectively, under the usual Regulations, without Payment of any Duty whatever; and that if any Rice which final have been imported into any Port of this Kingdom, not herein before specially named, and shall have been warehoused upon the Importer's Bond in Manner aforefaid, shall, within the Time herein before mentioned, be taken out of the Warehouse wherein it shall have been to secured, to be exported directly from thence, the Bond entered into for the Payment of the faid Duties thereon shall be discharged in like Manner as Bonds entered into for the Duties upon Tobacco, are directed to be discharged by any Act of Parliament in Force.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majetty's Treafury, and the Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively Steph. Cottrell. appertain.
