A PROCLAMATION,

For Encouraging Seamen and Landmen to enter themfelves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS it is Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all fuch Seamen and Landmen who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service; We have thought sit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation: And We do hereby promife and declare, That all fuch Able Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who shall, on or before the Thirtieth Day of June next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or Officers employed in Tenders, or at Rendezvous on Shore, for Raising Men for the Service of Our Navy, shall receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Three Pounds each Man; and all such Ordinary Scamen, fit for Our Service, who shall so enter themselves as aforefaid, shall receive the Sum of Two Pounds each Man: And all such Able-Bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Twenty Shillings each Man, as Our Royal Bounty. Such respective Sums to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Cheque, residing at the Ports or Places where the Ships, into which they shall be entered, shall be, immediately after the Third Muster of such Seamen and Landmen. And We do declare, that the Qualifications of the Seamen and Landmen, fo entering themselves as aforesaid, shall be certified by the Captain, Master, and Boatswain of the Ship or Veffel where they shall enter. And, for Prevention of any Abuses, by any Persons leaving the Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the faid Bounty-Money, We do hereby declare and command, that such Seamen and Landmen, belonging to any of Our Ships or Ves-sels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on Board any other of Our said Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said

Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits.

By the KING, A PROCLAMATION,

For Recalling and Prohibiting Scamen from serving Foreign Princes and States, and for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves.

GEORGE R.

I HEREAS We are informed, That great Numbers of Mariners and Seafaring Men, Our natural-born Subjects, are in the Service of divers Foreign Princes and States, to the Prejudice of Our Kingdom; We have therefore thought it necesfary, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and do hereby strictly charge and command all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatfoever and wherefoever, (being Our natural-born Subjects) who are in the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or do serve is any Foreign Ship or Vessel, that forthwith they, and every of them, do (according to their known and bounden Duty and Allegiance) withdraw themselves, depart from, and quit fuch Foreign Services, and return Home to their Native Countries. And farther, We do hereby strictly prohibit and forbid all Masters cf Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrgihts, and other Seafaring Men whatfoever, (being Our natural-born Subjects) from entering, and do charge and command them, and every of them, from henceforth, to forbear to enter themselves into the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or to serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel whatsoever, without Our Special Licence first had and obtained in that Behalf; to all which We expect due Obedience and exact Conformity. And We do hereby publish and declare, that the Offenders to the contrary shall not only incur Our just Displeasure, but be proceeded against for their Contempt according to the utmost Severities of the Law. And We do | furrender themselves on Board one of Our Ships or hereby declare, that if any such Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, or other Seafaring Men, (being Our Subjects) shall be taken in any Foreign Service by the Turks, Algerines, or any others, they shall not be reclaimed by Us as Subjects of Great Britain. And we hereby further promife and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman shall be paid any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secrete him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our faid Service by any of Our Sea Officers employed for raifing Men, on or before the Thirtieth Day of June next; the faid Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen fo discovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy; and at the Out-Ports by the Naval Officers (where there are any;) and (where there are no Naval Officers) by the Collectors of Our Customs, immediately, upon a Certificate being produced to the faid Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Collectors respectively, by the Person who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforefaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names and Number of Seamen procured in consequence of his Discovery; the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take such Seaman or Seamen for Our Service.

For pardoning such Seamen and Marines as have deferted, and shall return into His Majesty's Service on or before the Thirtieth Day of June next.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS We are defirous to give all due Encouragement to such Seamen as may have deferted from any of Our Ships since the First Day of January, One thousand seven hundred and eightyfour, and shall be willing to return to Our Service: We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby promise Our most gracious Pardon to all such Deserters as shall repair on Board randon to all such Deserters as shall repair on Board any of Our Ships of Vessels on or before the Thirtieth Day of June next; and We do hereby surther promise Our most gracious Pardon to all such Seamen as, having deferted, are now belonging to some one of Our Ships (in which Ship they are hereby permitted to continue) and do declare that such Deserters shall be intitled to receive all transports. fuch Deferters shall be intitled to receive all Wages that may be due to them in the Ship from which they may have deserted, at the Time of such Defertion. And We do also hereby promise Our most gracious Pardon to all Marines who may have deferted from Our Service since the said First Day of January, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-four, and shall, on or before the said Thirtieth Day of June next, surrender themselves at the Head-Quarters of the Marines established at Portsmouth, Plymouth or Chatham, or to any Recruiting Party of Our faid Forces: And We do hereby declare, that all Seamen and Marines, fo surrendering themselves as aforesaid, shall be released and discharged from all Profecutions, Imprisonments and Penalties commenced or incurred by reason of such Offence. But We do hereby further declare, that all fuch Deferters, whether Seamen or Marines, who shall not, on or before the faid Thirtieth Day of June next,

Vessels of War, or at the Head-Quarters of the Marines established at Portsmouth, Plymouth or Chatham, or to some Recruiting Party of the said Forces, or who shall hereafter absent themselves from the Ships to which they belong, or from the Marine Quarters, without Leave from their Commanding Officers, shall be tried at a Court Martial, and being found guilty, shall be deemed unfit Objects of Our Royal Mercy, and shall suffer the Punishment of Death, or such other Punishment as they shall be condemned to suffer by Sentence of the said Court. Stockbolm, May 7.

His Swedish Majesty crossed the River Kymene, and entered the Russian Territories on the 28th of April, as he had proposed. The next Day, in the Evening, he attacked the Post of the Russians at Valkiala, and carried it, after a well-fought Action which lasted for several Hours. The Russians left 50 Men dead upon the Field of Battle, and a Number were killed in the Pursuit; 60 of their light Troops were made Prisoners, and a valuable Magazine of different Kinds of Provisions fell into the Hands of the King. The Number of Killed on the Part of the Swedes was not considerable, but many Officers as well as Privates were wounded by the Grape Shot from the Enemy's Batteries. The King of Sweden himself received a Contusion on the Shoulder:

Baron Hamilton, who was dispatched with the News to Stockholm, relates, that the Russians had about the same Time attacked Baron Armselt at Kiernakoski, but had been repulsed, with the Loss of 200 Men and two Pieces of Cannon.
