The faid Willliam Lownds or Lowins, otherwife called Hope, is about Thirty-five Years of Age, Five Feet Eight or Nine Inches high, flout made, dark Complexion, has remarkably good black Hair, which he wears tied behind; he has the Appearance of a Seafaring Man, and is supposed to have been born at Congleton in Cheshire, has been in Ireland lately, and has a little of that Dia ect : He has lived at Sunderland, and was married there about Ten Years ago, but has

not lived with his Wife for fome Years. He was again married at Alfreton in Derby-foire, in 1785, to Amy Clark, by whom he has two Children, and has refided at Hexham in Northumherland fince the 8th of March laft. He left that Place the 4th Inftant with his Wife and Family, whom he left at Darlington, and after transacting jome Business at the Two Banks there, he came to London in the Mail Coach, and arrived on Monday Morning the 7th Infant, and immediately went to Mrf. Smith, Wright and Gray, Bankers, where he negetiated a Bill of Ex-change, and wrote the Name "W. Lowinds" thereon.

He is supposed to have in his Possefion a Promissory Note of one of the Banks at Newcaftle, dated 3d June, 1790, for Oue Hundred Pounds, payable on Demand to Mr. William Hope, or Order.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the faid William Lownds or Loavins, otherwile called Hope, of the faid Robbery of the Mail, will be entitled to a Reavard of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Perfon, whether an Accom-plice in the faid Robbery, or knowing thereof, Jball make Difcovery whereby the faid William Lownds or Lowins, otherwije called Hope, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of the Party, be entitled to the same Re-ward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, and will also receive His Maj fty's most gracious Pardon.
