liam Lownds or Lowins, otherwife William Hope, on Sufpicion of baving robbed the Mail between Penrith and Kefwick on the 25th of February; 1790, is the Perfon who also robbed the Mail between Warrington and Northwich, on the 11th of March, 1788, and . Vikewife robbed the Mail between Chefter and Frod-fham on the 29th of June, 1789.

The faid William Lewins was born in the Parish of Aftbury, near Congleton, in Chejbire, and was married at Alfreton in Derbysbire the 11th of July, 1785, to Amie Clarke.

to Amie Clarke. He liwed at Chefterfield in Derbyfhire for about Two Years previous to the first Robbery of the Mail, and followed the Business of a Weaver. He negotiated a Bill of Exchange for 201. which was taken out of the Jaid Mail at Chefterfield a few Days after that Robbery. On the 22d of March, 1788, he negotiated to Melf. Pather and Parises of Lords, arother Bill of Fr.

Roper and Rayner, of Leeds, another Bill of Ex-change, taken out of the fame Mail, for 691. 5s. 6d. which he endorfed in the Name of "Wm. Brown."

On the 18th of April, 1788, he negotiated to Meff. Wilberforce, Smiths and Co. of Hull, a Bill of Ex-

change for 1111. likewife taken out of that Mail, and endorfed the fame Name, "Wm. Brown," thereon. "He absconded from Chesserfield in the fame Month, and was advertifed in the London Gazette of the 26th

of May, 1788.

On the 11th of April, 1789, about Eleven Weeks previous to the 29th of June, 1789, the Day on which the Mail between Chefter and Fredsham was robbed, he went with his Wife and Child to live at Beaumaris in North Wales, offuming the Name of William Hutchinfon, and lodged with one Mrs. Corry: In a few Days after this Robbery, he abjconded from Beaumaris, and early in August following be nego-tiated at Oxford a Bill of Exchange for 141. 181. which was taken out of this Mail, and endorsed it in the Name of Wm. Mall."
