Madrid, June 30:

E have Letters from Barcelona, which fay, That the 20 inflant, the Sieur Evertz arrived there with the Squah dron under his Command, and that he had put allore 3000 Spanilb "ol-

he had put alhore 3000 Spanifb 'oldiers, which he took on Board at Malaga. That the day before there arrived likewife 1200 men from Milan; and that the Spanifb Armada, commanded by the Prince de Montefarchio, was every day expected there from Sicily. The Marquis de Leganez has taken upon him the Government of Catalonia, pro interim, tilt the arrival of the Duke of Bournonville.

Ditto, fuly 13. The King is diffatisfied with the Count de Monterey, for the loss of Puyfarda; he is commanded to remain at Signenza, 20 miles off, till he have juffified himfelf; and that he may do it. Commissioners are appointed to hear him. Don Melchor de la Cueva, Duke of Albuquerque, who had fuch another trouble, having been declared innocent by his Judges, covered the last week as Grandee before the King. The Marquis d'Algava s appointed to fucceed Don Inigo de To.edo, in the Government of Oran, and accordingly he is gone thither. - A Gom-million having been granted by the King, for the examining of Frauds committed in the Lading of the Galeons, and New-Spain Fleet, lying in the Bay of Cadiz, and for the inquiring after all French Manufactures, as well on Board as on Shore, the fame has been very firicity executed, and above 450 Bales of French Goods have been feized on Shore, and above 900 more on Board the Galcons, befudes others thrown into the Sea by the Officers, to fave their credit, and prevent punifhment.

Vienna, July 12. The Baron de Crakaw, Envoy of the Elector of Brandenburg, who, we told you in our laft, had had Audience of the Emperor, has been fince to visit the several Ministers of this Court, and to lay b fore them the Reafons which induce his Electoral Highnels to refule the Conditions offered by France for a G. neral Pcace, for as much as they concern him, and to defire the Affiftances of the Emperor in the continuance of the War. From Hungary we have Advice, That the Rebels, upon the approach of the Imp"rial Troops, had been forced to quit the Blokade of Calcham, with the loss of risoo men, and four pieces of Cannon. That General Leflie continues to draw all the Force he possibly can together, and pretends to form an Army of 20000 men, and that very speedily, which the Rebels will not be able to make head against. The last Letters we had from *Poland*, affure us, that things between the Turks and the Moscovites were going to extremities, that both fides feemed refolved to purfue the War with great eagerness, that the Moseovites on their part would bring the greatest Army into the Field that had been feen in that Countrey in, many,

ycars; but that which fomewhat difcomposed their Affairs, was the continuance of the indifposition of the young Czar, which was the caufe of much division among the great men of that Court. Straelfond, July 12. We are now, in a manner,

Straelfond, July 12. We are now, in a manner, again befieged by Land and Water, the Brandenburgs and Lunenburgs flutting us up, that nothing can come to us by Land; and the Danes Fleet lies before the Ille of Rugen, having fuffered much damage by the late florms, fo that we believe their flips n.ed reparation, and that they will not as yet attack the faid Ifland, for the defence of which all neceffary preparations are made by the Suedes. We have News by Sca, that the King of Sueden has taken Cbriffianjtadt by florm.

Anclam, July 13. Last Monday his Electoral Highnets of Brandenburgh arrived here, and caufed a Camp to be marked a mile from hence; there are already eight Regiments, and the rest of the Army is expected to day or to morrow, fo that we shall see fome Action very suddenly, The Electoral Prince is likewise expected here.

Electoral Prince is likewife expected here. Hambargb, July 16. They write from the Countrey of Mecklenburg, That the Elector of Braudenburgs Army was 10000 men ftrong, but that his defign was not yet known, and that the Innenburgs ftood likewife ready to march. We hear from the Lunenburgs Countrey, that befides the Forces that are gone into Pomeren, hve Companies are detach d of every Regiment, and are to go to join the Imperialifis near the Rbine, to act again the French. It is confirmed from Riga, by Letters of July t. that Velt Marefchal Horne was expected there from Stockholm, and that the Linomian Army was to march to foon as he arrives, but how ftrong they were, they could not certainly tell; that the Turks made great preparations againft the Molcovites, and that the great Czar would go in perfon into the Field againft them.

Copenhagen, fuly 18. The late Commander of Elfinburg hath been not only beheaded in the Suedilh Camp, but his Head for a greater ignominy, hath been fetup upon a Pole in the High-wdy, the King of Sueden being extreamly offended that he defended the Caffle of Elfinburg no better 1 he firong Fortrefs of Babus holds out full, and it appears that the taking of it is not fo caffe, a work, as it was at first believed. The King and Queen are at prefette at Landferoon, whether the Heer Tromp is gone to take his leave of them, in order to his freturn home. The lait report we had of the Suedes having made an Affault upon Chriftian fladt, and of their having been repulfed in it, is no more confirmed than feveral other reports we have formerly had of the fame kind; it is certain, that the place begins to be very much fineightned, and that the Suedes knowing very well e it is not likely they will expose their men in attacking a place which of necefity much fail of its own accord into their hands.
