The Gentlemen to wear Black Coats, and Black or plain White, or White and Gold, or White and Silver Stuff Waistcoats full trimmed, coloured Swords and Buckles.

And on Thursday the 11th Instant the Court to go out of Mourning.

Madrid, October 14.

Advices have been received here, mentioning that the City of Oran, on the Coast of Africa, has been almost entirely destroyed by a violent Earthquake, and that a considerable Part of its Inhabitants, as well as of the Spanish Garrison, are said to have perished in the Ruins. Accounts have also been received from Carthagená of a Fire, which happened a few Days ago in that Dock-Yard, and which, besides doing other Damage, has entirely consumed a new Ship of the Line.
