May your Majesty long continue to reign in the Hearts of a free and united People, and in the full Enjoyment of that Prosperity, which your Majesty's Subjects owe to your watchful Care and Attention to their Welfare.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Right Worshipful the Mayor, Aldermen and Citizens of the City of Worcester, in Common Council assembled.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen and Citizens of the City of Worcester, beg Leave to approach your Majesty's Throne with our Congratulations that the Apprehensions we lately had of this Country being involved in the Calamities of War are happily removed.

The Preservation of Peace, so essential to the Prosperity of a Commercial Nation, we attribute to the firm and spirited Measures of your Majesty, aided by the unparalleled Exertions of your Ministers, by which your Majesty has been enabled to obtain a Settlement of the Dispute with Spain, on Terms both honourable and satisfactory to this Nation.

It is our fervent Prayer that your Majesty may long reign over these Kingdoms in Health, Peace and Prosperity.
