The Ladies to wear Black Silk or Velvet, coloured Ribbons, Fans and Tippetts, or plain White, or White and Gold, or White and Silver Stuffs, with Black Ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear Black Coats, and Black or plain White, or White and Gold, or White and Silver Stuff Waistcoats, full trimmed, coloured Swords and Buckles.

And on Thursday the 7th of April next the Court to go out of Mourning.

The Weather having continued unseasonably mild and wet during the greatest Part of the Winter, we are alarmed with frequent Accidents of the Plague in different Quarters of this Residence. Amongst other Sufferers, the Captain of a French Ship, and one of his Seamen, were carried off by the contagious Malady a few Days ago.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that on Sunday the 20th of February last, about Three o'Clock in the Morning, a Gun, loaded with Two Bullets, was discharged at the Bedchamber Window of Mrs. Jones, Wife of Thomas Jones, of Fritton Hall, in the Parish of Fritton, in the County of Suffolk, Esq; by some evil-disposed Person unknown; fortunately, however, one of the Bullets lodged in the Window Shutter, and the other, although it passed through the Shutter, was stopped by the Window Curtain, and fell upon the Ground; and that it appears, from several Circumstances, that the said Gun was discharged at the said Window, with the felonious Intent of murdering the said Mrs. Jones, who was, at that Time, in Bed in the said Chamber, in the Absence of her Husband.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in firing the Gun as abovementioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually fired the said Gun as aforesaid) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
