casion, where Two States were placed, One for the Sovereign, and the other, on the Left, for the Duke, of Crimson Velvet, richly laced with Gold, and decorated with Plumes of Ostrich Feathers; with a Chair on either Side for the Two Plenipotentiaries, and a Table near the Sovereign's State to lay the Habit and Ensigns upon.

The Order of the Procession was as follows:

Francis Townsend, Esq; Windsor Herald, in his Coat of Arms and Collar, bearing the Sovereign's Commission.

Sir Isaac Heard, Knight, Garter Principal King of Arms, One of the Plenipotentiaries, in his Mantle, with his Sceptre, and bearing the Mantle of the Order, supported by William Garthshore, Esq; and Charles William Batt, Esq;

The first Plenipotentiary, Morton Eden, Esq, His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of Dresden.

preceded by the Great Cup Bearer and the Marshal of the Court, and supported by Colonel Helmot, Commander of the Guards, and General de Berbisdorss, Commander of the Town and Castle.

Coming into the Great Hall, the Music played, and the Procession advanced, with Three Reverences to the Sovereign's State, and the Ensigns were laid upon the Table; the Duke and the Plenipotentiaries taking their Seats, and all others going to their respective Stations. The Music having ceased, the first Plenipotentiary rose up, and addressed His Serene Highness in a Latin Oration, which was answered, at the Duke's Command, by his Excellency Silvius Frederick Lewis, Baron de Franckenberg, Actual Privy Councillor and Minister of State; all Persons standing.

Then Garter delivering the Commission to the first

Then Garter delivering the Commission to the first Plenipotentiary, he presented it to the Duke, who gave it to his Secretary to read; which having done, (all Persons standing) he returned it to His Serene Highness, who delivered it to Garter.

The Music then again played; and being done, Garter, with the usual Reverences, taking up the Mantle, delivered it to the first Plenipotentiary, and they both invested His. Serene Highness therewith, Garter pronouncing the Admonition. They next put on the Hood, Collar and George, with the proper Admonition by Garter. They then prefented the Book of Statutes to His Serene Highness, who delivered to them a Certificate of his Reception of the Order and Nomination of a Proxy.

Lastly, they placed the Cap and Feathers upon His Serene Highness's Head, who, making a Reverence to the Sovereign's State, sat down in his own, and the Plenipotentiaries in their Places.

Music then played for some Time; after which Garter King of Arms proclaimed the Sovereign's Stile, and then the Duke's; Drums beating and Trumpets sounding. The Plenipotentiaries, the Ministers, Great Officers, and other Persons of Distinction, congratulated His Serene Highness upon his Investiture; and the Procession returned in the same Order as it came; the Duke's Train being borne by Two Gentlemen of the Chamber.

A splendid Banquet was prepared, at which were present Her Serene Highness the Duchels; Her Serene Highness's Sister, Wilhelmina Louisa-Christiana, Daughter of the Reigning Dake of Saxe-Meiningen, and Wife of Prince Adolphus, Landgrave of Hesse-Philippsthal; the Princess Victoria-Amelia-Ernestina, of Anhalt-Bernbourg-Schaumburg; the Duke's Brother, Prince Augustus of Saxe Gotha, and the whole Court; besides several Foreigners of Distinction, together with the English Noblemen and Gentlemen who walked in the Procession. The Duke dined in the full Habit of the Order, his Cap and Feather being held behind his Chair. Garter also dined in his Mantle.

When the Delert was upon the Table, His Serene Highness put on his Cap, stood up, and, taking it off again, drank, 1st, the Sovereign's Health; 2d, the Queen, Prince of Wales and all the Royal Family; 3d, the Knights Companions of the Most Noble Order of the Garter. The Plenipotentiaries then drank, 1st, the Duke's Health; and then Property to the Illustrious House of Saxe-Gotha.

The whole Ceremony was conducted with the most ferupulous and respectful Attention to the Forms prescribed.

In the Evening there was a Drawing-Room and numerous Supper; and during the whole Time of the Residence of the Plenipotentiaries at Gotha, they were daily honored with every possible Mark of Condescension and Favor from Their Serene Highnesses the Duke and Duchess, Prince Augustus, the Landgrave, and the Princess; and experienced the utmost Attention, Respect and Kindness from the whole Court.
