Rig to flay there, till they have gathered the Arrears of their Contributions. The Marquis de los Balbates, the chief of the Spanifb Embally at Nimeguen, intends to make a turn hither with his whole Family.

Hague, Sept.27. The death of the Bilhop of Munfler is confirmed, and the Bilhop of Paderborne, who was his Coadjutor, is to be his Succeffor: But, it's believed, the Dukes of Lunenburg will policis themfelves of the Dutchy of Ferden, and what the late Bilhop had in the Dutchy of Bremen, for their Troops we hear are moving that way. Her Highnefs the Princefs of Orange has been indifpoled, and it was feared would have milearried, but at prefent, God be thanked, the is pretty well again. The Prince, fo foun as Maeffricht is reflored to the State, intends to make a flep thither, to fettle the Affans of that City as well Civil as Military.

Amfterdam, Sept. 30. This morning we have an account that Viceadmiral Evertz is arrived in the Texel with his Squadron, and feveral Merchantmen under his Convoy, from the Streights. They came from Cadiz the 5th inflant. The faid Squadron was compofed of 18 Men of War, 9 belonging to this Admiralty, 4 to the Maefe, and 5 to the Northern quarter.

Pais 5 Stept. 27. The Affair of the Republick of Genoma is accommodated, the Epvoy of that State having made the Submiffions required, and the King has given Orders for the difcharging all the Genome's Ships that have been taken by his M. noi War or Gallies. From the Rhine we have an account, that a Party of the Garifon of Marstrichs, burnt the 19th inflant feveral Villages in the Countrey of Juliers, for being waating in their Countributions. Our Letters from the Marefehal de Crequi's Camp are dated the aoth inflant at Minfelds, they tell us, that the Imperialifts begun to have great want of Forsge, which would fuddenly oblige them to decamp. That the 19th arrived in the Camp Depuies from Spire, and had offered the Marefehal de Grequi what Provifions and other Neceffaries their City could afford. They of the East India Company affure us, that the Miffionaries fent from hence, have converted the great King of Stam to the Christian Religion, and that that King is going to fend a fiplendid Embaffy hither. Monficur Morflein, great Treasfurer of Puland, is arrived here from Italy, where he hath paft fome part of this Summer, Yefterday we had the news here of the death of the B fhop of Mungfir, and that the Bifhop of Paderborne, who was his Coadjutor, was to fucceed him.

Dino, OEtb. 1. The agth paft, the Peace between this Crown and the Sistes General of the United Provinces, was published here with the Ceremonies usual on fuch occasions. The Marefchal de Bell (Jonds, who has been fome time in difgrace, has leave to return to Court. The King is going to make a new Effablishment for his Guards, as well as for the other Troops of his Houfhold, which will give them feveral new advantages, and they are to have much t cher cloaths than formerly. The King has refolved to reduce every Company of Foot from 60 to 45 men, and we are told that there are above 3000 Companies in the Kings Pay, fo that this Reform will amount to 45000 men. The Duke of Luxemburgb has paffed the Meng, e at Dinam with the Army under his commandy it is though the has his eye upon the Elector of Brandenburghs Countries and upon Julier.

Newcassle, Sept. 17. The Lord Hume having fent to inform Colonel Strother, (one of His Majesties Deputy-Lieutenants and Fustices of the Peace for the County of Northumberland) that several Scotch Men, who were declared Rebels and Fugitives by the Laws of Scotland, and His Majesties Privy Council there, barbored themselves on this side the Borders, and rode Armed up and down this County, and that they were lately at Learmouth, the faid Col. Strother, accompanied with the Brothers Col. Salkeild, Mr. Strother and Mr. Mar ley, with their Servants, went on Saturday last by break of day to Learmouth, to make search for the said Perfons, but not finding any of them, went thence to the Lord Humes, and there diperfed his Servants, to learn

what information they could of those Rebels. After dinner Colonel Strother, Col. Salkeild, Mr. Strother, Mr. Marley, and four Servants returning home, they overtook near Crokeham in this County 14 or 15 Horfemen well mounted and armed, who flopt when they came up to them; And Colonel Strother demanding what their business was, and whither they were going so well armeds They whipt out their Pistols, and before Colonel Strother and those with him could get out theirs, discharged them among ihem ; one shot took place upon Mr. Marley, and struck him in the bead, so that he fell down dead, Mr. Strother's Horse was killed, having three shot in him, and Colonel Strother was wounded ; but in return, they killed one of the Rebels, one Carr of Chirric-trees, upon which all the rest fied. It is faid that 4 others were wounded, and fince taken. The Coroners Inquest have fet upon the body of Mr. Marley, and upon examination of Witneffes, they found it Wilful Murther in one Henry Hall, Edward Young of Lefsford, Andrew Young of Coverton, Alexander Humes of Erkles, Andrew Grey, alias Morifon, Hector Aire, and in the rest, (whole Names are not yet known.) It was proved upon Oath, That they lay in wait for Colonel Strother and his Compani's coming back, having had intelligence that they had been fearching for them; and that one of them watching near Crokcham, gave the rest notice, and cryed, The Rogues are now coming, and if ever you will have your Revenge, you must take it now, &c. All poffible diligence is ufing for the difcovery and appreben-fion of this wicked Crew, in order to the bringing them to condign punishment.
