We are refolved to contribute, in the most effectual Manner in our Power, to difcountenance all fuch wicked and feditious Publications, and to difcourage all fuch Proceedings as tend to produce Riots and Tumults; and upon every Occafion to fhew ourfelves your Majefty's loyal and peaceable Subjects.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Affiftants and Common Council of the Borough of Colchefter, in the County of Effex, in Common Hall affembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Sub-VV jects, the Mayor, Aldermen, Affiltants and Common Council of the Borough of Colchefter aforefaid, humbly beg Leave to approach your Majefty with our grateful Thanks for your Royal Proclama-tion against those wicked and feditious Writings which of late have been printed and published, and which have been dispersed throughout the Kingdom with an Industry that too clearly evinces the malevolent Spirit of the Authors, ever active to give Effect to their Object, which can be no other than to excite Jealoufies and Difcontents in the Minds of your Majesty's happy, faithful and affectionate Subjects.

Whilft we thus express our Thanks, we humbly beg Leave to add, that we confider this well-timed Deciaration of your Royal Intention to carry the Laws against the Offenders into Execution, as a fresh Proof of your parental and unremitting Care for preferving the Peace and Happiness of your People.

Attempts fo repeatedly made to alienate the Minds of your faithful Subjects from their Duty to the beft of Kings, from their Attachment to the known and approved Laws of the Conflitution, and to weaken their Confidence in the Administration of Government, to which, under God, the Nation is indebted for it's present Prosperity, have given us inexpressible Concern; fearing, that without your Majesty's timely Intervention, those who were fully fensible of the Value, and truly grateful for the Enjoyment of fuch inestimable Blessings, might be deprived of them by the fubile Arts and factious Defigns of a Set of de-Iperate and disappointed Men, and their Adherents, whole Affociations and Correspondences we behold with the utmost Abhorrence and Detestation, confidering them calculated purposely to effect the Subverfion of all good Order and legal Authority, and to substitute in their Stead, Anarchy, Disorder and Confusion of every Kind through this happy Land.

Reflecting, with Gratitude, on the enviable Situation, which, under our prefent Form of Civil and Religious Government, we feel ourfelves poffeffed of, anxious alfo to preferve and transmit the fame unimpaired to Posterity, we most humbly beg Leave

to assure your Majesty, that, as far as in our Power, it shall be our greatest Ambition to render those Commands, with which your Majefty has been gracioufly pleased to charge us, as effectual as may be; fentible that any Remissness on our Parts would be a Neglect of Duty equally dangerous to the true Interests of this Borough, and to the Liberty, Peace, and Happiness of the Community at large.

May it pleafe your Majefty, WE, your Majefty's most faithful and dutiful Subjects, the Magistrates and Council of the ancient City of St. Andrew's, beg Leave to exprefs our most grateful Acknowledgements. for your Majesty's late Proclamation, intended to suppress feditious Writings, and to maintain Order and good Government. The paternal Goodness of our Sovereign, which has long endeared him to his People, was never, in our humble Opinion, more confpicuous, than in this recent Expression of his Royal Will; and we are alike difposed to lament and to condemn the Prevalence of that Frenzy, which conceals from Men the Bleffings they actually enjoy, and creates a Craving for others that are only ideal. From reading the History of the past, and viewing the Transactions of the prefent Times, we confider no Delution to be fo formidable
