Most Gracious Sowereign,

WE, the Bishop, Archdeacon and Chapter, and the Clergy of the Diocese of Landass, humbly tender to your Majesty or strongest Assurances of Loyalty to your Majesty's Person, of Attachment to your Family, of Zeal for the Principles of the Resolution and of any other Abbarrance of avery Atvolution, and of our utter Abhorrence of every Attempt to subvert the Constitution, in Church and State, then established, and since then improved.

The Improvements which the Constitution has received in the Judges being rendered more independent, in the Mode of determining contested Elections, in the Repeal of certain Penal Statutes respecting Protestant and Catholic Diffenters, in ascertaining the Rights of Juries, and in other Ways, have been more numerous and important during your Majesty's Reign than during the Reigns of all your Predecessors since the Revolution. We are thankful for what has been done, and without encouraging improper Modes of Innovation, in other Matters still perhaps requiring an Amendment, we trust that what is wanting, to render our Constitution perfect and permanent, will be accomplished by the deliberative Wisdom of the Legislature rather than by the rash Violence of democratic Faction.

When we compare our Situation, as Citizens of a free State, with that of those who are either struggling for that Liberty which we enjoy, or groaning under those entrusted to our Care the true Principles of that Slavery which we are in no Danger of, we can Religion, the Obedience and Subordination which

not but let the highest Value on that Form of Civil Government, from which our Happiness is derived; and we beg Leave, in the most fincere and solemn Manner, to declare to your Majesty, that in Propor-tion to this our Estimation of it's Worth, will be our Zeal for the Preservation of the Constitution.

SIRE,

DEPLY impressed with the Sense of your Majesty's unremitted Attention to the Happiness of your People, we beg Permission to approach your Throne with our Acknowledgements for the late Instance of your paternal Regard in your Majesty's gracious Proclamation.

Without affuming to determine on the Plans of Government to be adopted or rejected by other independent Communities, we avow, on a Conviction of it's Excellence, our firong Attachment to our own peculiar Conflitution in Church and State. We exact, Sire, in a System in which Strength and Permanence arise from mutual Dependency and Control; in which general Harmony results from Subordina-

tion of Parts; in which Difference of Condition supplies the Motive and the Reward of Industry and Merit; in which, in short, the Pyramid of Liberty, from a Base, extending over the whole State, ascends and narrows to a single Stone, which crowns and gives Integrity to the Building.

With these Sentiments, Sire, we regard with Contempt every Endeavour to shake the Steadiness of our Loyalty, as Citizens of Great Britain and Subjects of your Majesty's mild Government. Happy as we are, we are not disposed to hazard the Possession of certain in the Pursuit of visionary Happiness. We are not, Sire, to be tempted by the fallacious Glare of theoretic Persection, from the solid Footing of Experience, into the trackless and dangerous Wilderness of Experiment.

We approach you then, Sire, with Hearts firmly attached to your Majesty and your illustrious House, and we unite our Voice with the general Suffrage of Britain in Favour of that particular Scheme of Government from which, as from their immediate Source, thou the numerous Blessings which we enjoy; Bieffings of Order and Freedom, of National Affluence and Greatness.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.
