WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last Selfion of Parliament, intituled, " An Act for the " more effectual Administration of the Office of a .. Justice of the Peace in such Parts of the Counties of Middlefex and Surry as lie in and near the " Metropolis, and for the more effectual Prevention " of Felonies," it is enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty to cause Seven several Public Offices to be established in or near the following Places, namely, the Parifhes of Saint Margaret Westminster, Saint James Westminster, Saint James Clerkenwell, Saint Leonard Shoreditch, Saint Mary Whitechapel, and Saint Paul Shadwell, in the County of Middlefex, and at or near Saint Margaret's Hill, in the Borough of Southwark in the County of Surry, and at each of the faid Public Offices to appoint Three fit and able Perfons, being Juffices of the Peace for the faid County of Middlefex, and County of Surry respectively, to execute the Office of a Jultice of the Peace; together with fuch other Justices of the Peace for the faid Counties respectively as may think proper to attend.

And whereas it is thereby further enacted, that from and after the Establishment of the faid Seven feveral Public Offices as aforefaid, (Twenty-one Days Notice thereof being given in the London Gazette) no Justice or Justices of the Peace for the County of Middlefex, County of Surry, City and Liberty of Westminster, or Liberty of the Tower of London, or his or their Clerk or Clerks, or any Perfon for them, other than at the faid Public Offices, fhall, directly or indirectly, upon any Pretence, or under any Colour whatever, (on Forfeiture of the Penalty in the faid Act mentioned, except as thereby is excepted) take or receive any Fee, Gratuity, Reward or Recompence for any Act by him or them done, or to be done, in the Execution of his or their Office or Employ as Juffice or Juffices of the Peace, Clerk or Clerks, as aforefaid, within the Limits of the weekly Bills of Mortality, or within the Pariflues of Saint Mary-le-Bone, Paddington, Saint Pancras, Kenfington, and Saint Luke at Chelfea, in the faid County of Middlefex.

Notice is hereby given, That His Majefty hath, in Purfuance of the faid Act of Parliament, cauled to be eftablished Seven feveral Public Offices, and at each of them hath appointed Three fit and able Perfons, being Juffices of the Peace for the County of Middlefex and County of Surry respectively, to execute the Office of a Juffice of the Peace in the faid Offices, together with fuch other Juffices for the faid Counties respectively as may think proper to attend: That is to fay,
