Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on Board any other of Our said Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be punished according to their Demerits.

TIS Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no Person or Persons whatever shall, from and after the Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, until the 1st Day of March, 1793, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed, out of or from any Port or Place in Great Britain, or load or lay on Board, or cause or procure to be loaded or laid on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made of Barley, Beer or Bigg: His Majesty nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, and doth hereby order, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prohibit the Exportation of any Foreign Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made of Barley, Beer or Bigg, which shall have been imported into this Kingdom, and warehoused in the Manner and upon the Conditions mentioned in an Act passed in the Thirtyfirst Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An · Act for regulating the Importation and Exporta-" tion of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on " Foreign Corn imported, and of the Bounty on " British Corn exported;" nor to prohibit the carrying Coasswife, or the carrying out and exporting of Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made of Barley, Beer or Bigg, in the Manner and in the same Proportions and Quantities, and from and to the same Ports and Places, as is by the faid Act allowed, at fuch Times as Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made of Barley, Beer or Bigg, are prohibited to be

exported, by Reafon of the Price of Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Bifcuit made of Barley, Beer or Bigg, being at or above the Prices mentioned in Table B. in the faid Act contained, fubject to the like Securities, Conditions, Regulations and Restrictions, Forfeitures and Penalties as are required and imposed by the faid Act, or by any other Act now in Force, in any of the Cases aforesaid: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHereas an Act of Parliament was passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, " An Act to impower His Majesty to prohibit " the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce " the Law for impowering His Majesty to pro-" hibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any " Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to " impower His Majesty to restrain the carrying " Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any " Sort of Arms or Ammunition:" And His Majesty, judging it necessary to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder or Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, out of this Kingdom, or carrying the same Coastwife, for some Time, doth, therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months from the Date of this Order in Council, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwife, any Gunpowder or Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transport. ing the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwife, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and fuffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by the aforementioned Act: And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain,
