That this Meeting, in the most solemn Manner, do hereby call upon every good Citizen to co-operate with them to the same salutary End; to discourage every Attempt made by Republicans and Levellers against Liberty, Order and Property; and each in his own Person to be ready at all Times to accompany and assist the Magistrates of this Borough and Neighbourhood in the Suppression of every Tumult.
