AT a Meeting, in Guildhall, of the Alderman, Deputy, Common Council, and Inhabitants of the above Ward, convened to oppose the Propagation of Opinions repugnant to the British Constitution and the most valuable Privileges of Englishmen,

JOHN BOYDELL, Esq; Alderman, in the Chair,

It was resolved,

1st. That, glorying in the Revolution of 1688, which placed the present Family on the Throne of these Kingdoms, and uniting with our Fellow Citizens in their honest Expressions of Attachment to our most excellent Constitution and Government by King, Lords and Commons, which has deservedly obtained the Admiration of the World; and being equally zealous in the Cause of Public Tranquillity, we are determined to support, by every manly and commendable Exertion, the Magistrates of this City in the due Exercise of the Law, for the Preservation of Peace, the Protection of Property, the Security of Liberty, and the Perpetuity of every Privilege and Enjoyment peculiar to this highly-favored Nation.

Resolved,

2dly. That a Gratuity of Ten Guineas be paid on Conviction, by the Ward Treasurer, for apprehending any Person within this Ward distributing, posting up Papers, or exposing any Matter to the Public Eye containing Opinions and Sentiments tending to encourage Sedition and treasonable Subversion of the Laws of this Land; and that the Constables of this Ward be desired to use all Vigilance in bringing such Persons before the Magistrates.

Resolved,

3dly. That the Thanks of this Meeting be given to John Boydell, Esq; for his impartial and zealous Conduct as Chairman of this Meeting.

And resolved,

That the Resolutions be signed by the Chairman, and inserted in the Morning and Evening Papers.

AT a Time when some of the most considerable Societies of Men in this Kingdom have thought it right to stand forward to check the insidious Designs of a wicked Party, who would wish to alter and debase our present excellent Constitution, the Corporation of Trinity-House of Deptford Strand cannot forbear to shew their Detestation of the daring Attempts of designing Men to disturb the Peace and Happiness of this Country: They have therefore thought it proper to issue forth Directions and Instructions to all their Officers and Servants on the River Thames, and in every Part where they have Jurisdiction, to watch over the Conduct and Behaviour of such Disturbers of the Public Peace, in order that they may be brought to Justice.
