Whitehall, December 22, 1792.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that on Saturday the 8th Instant the Reverend Henry Zouch, of Sandal in the West Riding of the County of York, one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the said County, did receive by the Post from Wakefield, as appears by the Post-mark thereon, an anonymous threatening Letter, containing the following Words, viz.

" We caution you that you will be taken Particular Notice of by our Fraternity should a Parliamentary Reform, or a Tumultuous Riot take Place, if so happens as I have not the least Doubt to the contrary, We will support what's here laid down at the Hazard of our Lives.  
" God save the Nation— And send such People as You out of it

" Yours  
" Anonymous."

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in writing and sending the Letter abovementioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further Encouragement, a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS is hereby promised to any Person

making such Discovery as aforesaid, (except as is before excepted) to be paid upon the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders, by Mr. Steer, the Constable of Wakefield, in whose Hands the said Letter is lodged.

Whitehall, December 22, 1792.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that on the Morning of Thursday the 13th Instant, Mr. Hart, Publican, on the Parade, Plymouth, received from the Letter Carrier belonging to the General Post-Office at Plymouth, to whom it had been delivered by the Letter Carrier of Plymouth Dock, an anonymous threatening Letter, without any Post Mark thereon, of which the following is a Copy, viz.

" P. D. Dec. 12, 1792 "

" Mr. Hart "

" I am sorry you should have any Thing to do with the exalted Patriot Mr. Tho. Paine we renounce your Proceedings. Testify your Sorrow or beware of your Life. A Brace of Balls or a prepared Stiletto may shortly find the Way to your Heart and the Hearts of your detestable Accomplices whose Conduct is that of the groveling Flatterers of Vice. I'd have know that neither you or they shall pass unpunished unless you speedily and publicly recant. I know them all, and have to assure you & beg that you will communicate it to them that many of us are united to rid the Community of such despicable Fellows either in a public Manner or a covert Act
