Now be it known that the said [Person's Name] hath Licence to lade on board the said Ship [Ship's Name], at and from any Port or Place belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, and Indian Corn, the Produce of the said United States, and no other Article whatsoever, and to carry the said Bread, Flour and Indian Corn to some Port or Place on the Island of Newfoundland; and on the Arrival of the said Ship at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Discharge in Newfoundland, the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of the said Ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there; and to indorse on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and shall thereupon receive a Certificate thereof from the said Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs.

This Licence to continue in Force for Calendar Months from the Date hereof.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Bailiff, Jurats, Town-Clerk, Freemen and Inhabitants of the Town and Port of Seaford, beg Leave to join the general Voice of the Nation, in approaching the Throne with Sentiments of sincere and inviolable Attachment to your Royal Person, Family and Government; and expressing our Gratitude for the many Blessings we now enjoy; and the firm Confidence we entertain that by your Majesty's constant Exertions for the Happiness of your People, the Tranquillity of this our native Country will long continue uninterrupted.

We cannot avoid expressing our Detestation and Abhorrence of those daring, delusive, and seditious Publications which have been so industriously circulated in this Kingdom, tending to disturb the Har-

piness, Prosperity, and Tranquillity now existing therein.

We beg Leave to assure your Majesty that we will use our utmost Endeavours, as Magistrates and Individuals, to discountenance all Attempts to establish Principles incompatible with our present excellent Constitution.

That your Majesty may long continue to reign over a loyal, free, happy, and united People, is our sincere and fervent Prayer.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

FEELING it to be an incontrovertible Truth, that the End of Civil Government is the Protection and Happiness of those who are placed under it's Care, and having no less our own Experience than the History of past Ages to bear Testimony to the superior Excellence of the British Constitution; we should esteem ourselves inexcusable if, at this Moment of Alarm and Disquiet, we should neglect to give your Majesty fresh Assurances of our warm and inviolable Attachment to your Majesty's Royal Person and Government.

In Proportion to our Conviction that this Kingdom far excels all others in the general Form of it's Civil Polity, and in the Enjoyment of every Blessing which can result from legal Subordination, our Surprise and Indignation are excited by the daring and wicked Attempts, which have been so industriously and repeatedly made, for the Purposes of infecting the Minds of your Majesty's faithful Subjects, seducing them from their Allegiance, and rendering them the dreadful Instruments of destroying their own and the Nation's Happiness, at the Expence of every social and sacred Obligation.

Under these Circumstances, we cannot but admire and approve your Majesty's paternal Regard for the Welfare of your People, which has been so recently exhibited in the Exertion of those Constitutional Powers, with which your Majesty is vested, for the Preservation of Peace and good Order; and we pledge ourselves to co-operate with these most salutary Intentions of your Majesty, by using every proper Means to restrain and punish that licentious and disorderly Spirit, which has been so artfully raised and fomented by the Enemies to your Majesty's Government.

In full Confidence that there is sufficient Energy in the Laws and Constitution of this Country to defeat every Attempt, both of it's foreign and internal Foes, to disturb it's Peace and interrupt it's Prosperity, we fervently beseech the Great Ruler of all Events to grant such Wisdom to your Majesty's Counsels, and such Efficacy to your Majesty's just Administration, as will secure to us a lasting Possession of those Advantages and Blessings, which we now so eminently enjoy.
