Time to be claimed by the faid Corps, and punished as Deferters.

And whereas feveral of the faid Deferters have been apprehended and are now in Gaol, or in Regimental Cuftody, His Majefty is likewife pleafed to grant them His free Pardon, of which they are to have the Benefit upon their Arrival at their own Corps, or upon their being enlifted by fome other Corps or Recruiting Party, according as their refpective Cafes may be, and in Conformity to the Conditions herein before fet forth.

. Any Soldier, who may have deferted fince the First of this instant February, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. IS Majesty is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to declare, and it is hereby declared, that all Soldiers who may have deferted His Majesty's Service before the 1st of this instant February, shall receive His Majesty's Pardon for such Offence or Offences of Defertion, on Condition that they join the Regiment in which they last ferved on or before the 30th Day of April next enfuing ; and In cafe the Regiment in which they last ferved shall not be within this Kingdom, fuch Deferters are then to furrender themfelves to any other Regiment of His Majesty's Regular Forces, to ferve therein, and be accordingly entitled to His Majefty's most gracious Pardon. And in cafe any fuch Deferters have been committed for fafe Cuftody to the feveral Gaols or Prifons belonging to the Counties, Towns, or Places where fuch Deferters have been found or apprehended, to the End that they might be proceeded against according to Law; and the Names of fuch Deferters Thall have been from Time to Time transmitted to His Majesty's Secretary at War for the Time being, purfuant to the Provisions of the Acts of Parliament made for punishing Mutiny and Defertion now in Force; His Majefty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, is pleafed to order, that all and every Gaoler and Gaolers, Keeper and Keepers of any Gaol, House of Correction, or Prison, where any such Deferter or Deferters is or are in Cuftody, shall difcharge him or them forthwith, without Fee or Reward, upon receiving a Certificate or Certificates, under the Hand of His Majefty's Secretary at War for the Time being, that the Name or Names of fuch Deferter or Deferters do appear to him to have been sranimitted to the War-Office, purfuant to the Pro-

visions of any of the faid Acis : And His Majethy doth hereby further order and require every fuch Gaoler or Keeper, within the Space of Seven Days after receiving any fuch Certificate as aforefaid, to make a Return to His Majefty's Secretary at War for the Time being of what fuch Gaoler or Keeper shall have done in purfuance of fuch Certificate, and of this His Majefty's Order in Council : Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall extend to discharge any Person or Persons, so in Custody for any such Offence of Defertion, who shall have been lawfully committed or detained in the Custody of any fuch Gaoler or Keeper, for any Crime, Caufe or Matter other than such Offence or Offences of Defertion.

Boats, whether British or French; employed in the Conveyance of Letters and Passengers between Great Britain and France, or the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, to pais and repais, as heretofore, with their refpective Complements of Men, be; and the fame is hereby, revoked and made void ; and that no Ship or Veffel whatfoever belonging to any of His Majefty's Subjects, except fuch as are or may be employed by His Majefty's Poft-Mafter General, in fnch Number as shall be approved of by One of His Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State, between the Ports of Great Britain and France, or between the Ports of this Kingdom and the Ports of the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, for the Purpole of conveying the Mails, and except fuch Ships or Veffels as are or may be employed by the Directors of the Post-Offices in France, or in the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, in fuch Number as shall be approved of by One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in confequence of any Agreement which has been or may be made for that Purpofe, for conveying the Mails between the Ports of Great Britain and France, and the Countries occupied by the Armies in France, be permitted to clear out or fail for any of the Ports of France, or of the Countries occupied by the Armies of France, until further Order.

And His Majefty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, is hereby further pleafed to order, that no Perfon or Perfons whatever be permitted to embark on board any of the before defcribed Ships or Veffels employed in carrying the Mails from this Kingdom
