H IS Majefty has been pleafed to caufe the following Proclamation to be publifhed, Commanding all Perfons being Pop.fh Recufants, or fo reputed, to depart from the Cities of *London* and *Wefiminifer*, and all other Places within Ten miles of the fame.

CHARLES R.

Hereas the Lords Spiritual and Tempora and Commons in Parliament Assembled, baving token into their ferious Confideration the Bloudy and Traiterous Defigns of Popish Recusants against His Majesties Sacred Perion and Government, and the Protestant Religion, bave (for prevention thereof) most humbly belought His Majesty to iffue forth Hu Royal Proclamation, to the effect, and for the purposes hereafter mentioned : The Kings most Excellent Majesty bath been Gracioushy pleased readily to condescend thereunto 7 And doth by this His Royal Proclamation straitly Charge and Command all perfons being Popific Reculants, or fo reputed, that they do on or before the Seventh day of November next enfu-ing (under pain of His Majejties bighest Displeafure, and of the seventh Execution of the Laws against them) depart and retire themselves and their Families from His Majesties Royal Palaces of Whitchall, Somerfee Houle, and St. James, the Cities of London and Wellminfter, and from all other Places within Ten miles distance of the same: And that no Person being a popish Recufant, or so reputed, do presume at any time bereafter to repair or return to His Majesties faid Palaces, or any of them, or to the faid Cities, or either of them, or within Ten miles of the fame.

Provided, That nothing before contained, fhall extend to luch Houlholders develling within the laid Cities, or either of them, or in any Place within Ten miles of the Jame, who being Traders, exercifing fome Trade or Manual Occupation, have been there lettled for the fpace of Twelve Months last past, in Houl's of their Own, and have not an Habitation ellewhere, and who fhall give in their Names, and the Names of all other Persons in their Families, to the two next fulfices of the Peace. And His Majefly doth firstly Charge and Command, That immediately after the faid Seventh day of November, the Conftables, Churchwaidens, and other Parish Officers within the laid Cities, and either of them, and within Ken miles of the Jame, do go from Houle to Houls in their several Parishes, Hamiets, Conftabularies, and Divisions respectively, and there take an Account of the Names and Surnames of all luch Persons as are Popish Reculants, or reputed so to be, as well Houlfolders ad Lodgers, or Servants, and to carry a List of their sames to the two next Fulfices of the Peace, who are bereby Required and Enjoined to fend for them, and every of them, and to tender to them and every of them, the Oaths of Allegiance and Sugremacy, and to commit to Prifon till the next fucceeding Selfions of the Peace, all fuch Perfons as shall refuje the faid Oaths, and at the faid next Selfions to proceed against them according to Law His Majelty hereby giving the faid Fustices to understand, That the better to enable them to tender the faid Oaths, His Majelty bath Commanded respective Commisfions to be iffued under His Great Seal of England, to the Fustices of Peace within the faid Cities of London and Weltminster, and the Places within Ten miles of the fame, to Authorize and Require them, or any two of them respectively, to administer the faid Oaths accordingly.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall, the Thirticth day of Oklober, 1678. in the Thirtieth year of Our Reign.

Dantzick, OGob. 22: The Letters from Livonia affure us, that the Suedes Army had paffed the Duna; and intended to take its march through Courland towards Prufia. From Po and we hear, that the Turks will not yet fuffer the Polifo Ambaffadors to return.

Vienna, Odob.23. Count Leslie lying very ill of a Fever, the Emperor has given the command of his Forces in Hungary to General Wurmb, and Orders are fent him to draw all the Force he can together y to fuppress the Rebels, who do not only favage and defroy the Countrey, but have attacked feveral important places, and made themfelves Mafters of them. In my laft I told you, that Father Fojeph was taken Prifoner, which the Rebels having an account of, they fent to the Imperialist, to let them know, that in the fame manner they freat the faid Father \hat{F} of epb, the Prisoners they have taken that be dealt with. The Emperor, we hear, is going to publish a General Pardon in Hurgary, and has committed that matter to. the Archbilhop of Gran. We have freih Letters from *Hungary*, which fay, that the Rebel, befieged *Cremnits*, and that they intended the 13th in ant to make a general Affault upon the place; and that another place, called Newfoll, was blocked up by them; and that Letters from Teckeli, to the Balla of Waradin, had been intercepted, in which he gives the Baffa an account of what the Rebels had done, and of the Booty they had made, and offers the Grand S g ior 100000 Ducats and the Grand Vilier half that Sum for their protection.

Hamburgh, Nov. 1. We have nothing new fince our laft, what we told you then of the fad condition) of the City of Straelfond, of which above two thirdslie in rulues, is confirmed by leveral perfors - comes from thence, who add, that fo foot as his Electoral Highnels had received the homage of the Magilfrates and Eurghers of that City, he would march to Griefwaldt, likewife to reduce that places and in the mean time, it's believed, will fend fome Troops towards Pruffia, to fecure that Country against the Suedes, who are marching that way from Linemia, From Denmark they only write, that the Armies were preparing to go into their Winter-quarters.
